#### About this chapter

Read this chapter attentively. It contains important information to prevent personal injury while installing and using your Freya projector. Furthermore, it includes several cautions to prevent damage to your Freya projector. Ensure that you understand and follow all safety guidelines, safety instructions and warnings mentioned in this chapter before installing and using the Freya projector. After this chapter, additional "warnings" and "cautions" are given depending on the procedure. Read and follow these "warnings" and "cautions" as well.

#### Clarification of the term "Freya" used in this document

When referring in this document to the term "Freya" means that the content is applicable for following Barco products:

• Freya, Freya MKII, Freya+

The Freya MKII is the successor of the Freya. Freya MKII has adaptations to the internal lightpath to achieve higher contrast. It is not possible to rebuild a Freya to a Freya MKII.

#### Model certification name

- Freya: SP4K-12C
- Freya MKII: SP4K-7CHC
- Freya+: SP4K-12CHC

## **1.1 General considerations**

#### **General safety instructions**

- Before operating this equipment please read this manual thoroughly and retain it for future reference.
- Installation and preliminary adjustments should be performed by qualified Barco personnel or by authorized Barco service dealers.
- All warnings on the projector and in the documentation manuals should be adhered to.
- All instructions for operating and use of this equipment must be followed precisely.
- · All local installation codes should be adhered to.

#### Notice on safety

This equipment is built in accordance with the requirements of the applicable international safety standards. These safety standards impose important requirements on the use of safety critical components, materials and insulation, in order to protect the user or operator against risk of electric shock and energy hazard and having access to live parts. Safety standards also impose limits to the internal and external temperature rises, radiation levels, mechanical stability and strength, enclosure construction and protection against the risk of fire. Simulated single fault condition testing ensures the safety of the equipment to the user even when the equipment's normal operation fails.

#### Notice on optical radiation

This projector embeds extremely high brightness (radiance) lasers; this laser light is processed through the projector's optical path. Native laser light is not accessible by the end user in any use case. The light exiting the projection lens has been diffused within the optical path, representing a larger source and lower radiance value than native laser light. Nevertheless the projected light represents a significant risk for the human eye and skin when exposed directly within the beam. This risk is not specifically related to the characteristics of laser light but solely to the high thermal induced energy of the light source; which is equivalent with lamp based systems.

Thermal retinal eye injury is possible when exposed within the Hazard Distance (HD). The HD is defined from the projection lens surface towards the position of the projected beam where the irradiance equals the maximum permissible exposure as described in the chapter "Hazard Distance".



**WARNING:** No direct exposure to the beam within the hazard distance shall be permitted, RG3 (Risk Group 3) IEC EN 62471-5:2015

**CAUTION:** Use of controls or adjustments or performance of procedures other than those specified herein may result in hazardous radiation exposure.

#### **Restricted access location**

This product may only be installed in a restricted access location. The definition of a "restricted access location" is a location for equipment where both of following applies:

- Access can only be gained by SERVICE PERSONNEL or by OPERATORS who have been instructed about the reasons for the restriction applied to the location and about the precautions that shall be taken.
- Access is through the use of the tool or lock and key, or other means of security, and is controlled by the authority responsible for the location.

Why a restricted access location: This is a RG3 product. Based on international requirements, no person is allowed to enter the projected beam within the zone between the projection lens and the related Hazard Distance (HD). This shall be physically impossible by creating sufficient separation height or by placing optional barriers. Within the restricted area operator training is considered sufficient. The applicable separation heights are discussed in "High Brightness precautions: Hazard Distance", page 22.

#### **Users definition**

Throughout this manual, the terms SERVICE PERSONNEL and TRAINED PROJECTIONIST refers to persons having appropriate technical training and experience necessary to be knowledgeable of potential hazards to which they are exposed (including, but not limited to HIGH VOLTAGE ELECTRIC and ELECTRONIC CIRCUITRY and HIGH BRIGHTNESS PROJECTORS) in performing a task, and of measures

to minimize the potential risk to themselves or other persons. The term USER and OPERATOR refers to any person other than SERVICE PERSONNEL or TRAINED PROJECTIONISTS, AUTHORIZED to operate professional projection systems.

The TRAINED PROJECTIONISTS may only perform the maintenance task described in the User & Installation manual. All other maintenance tasks and service tasks must be performed by qualified SERVICE PERSONNEL.

The DLP Cinema Systems are intended "FOR PROFESSIONAL USE ONLY" by AUTHORIZED PERSONNEL familiar with potential hazards associated with high voltage, high intensity light beams generated by lasers. Only qualified SERVICE PERSONNEL and TRAINED PROJECTIONISTS, knowledgeable of such risks, are allowed to perform service functions inside the product enclosure.

## **1.2 Safety training to be provided by the installer**

**WARNING:** The installer is responsible that the user is instructed. The user will sign a document to confirm that the instructions have been received and understood.

Refer to document "Declaration of user safety training" (Document number 601-0462) for training tick off and signing. Document can be found on the Barco website if not included in the box.

#### Usage

The Freya is intended for persons who have been instructed and trained by a skilled person (installer or service personnel) to identify energy sources that may cause injury and to take precautions to avoid unintentional contact with or exposure to those energy sources.

The skilled person must instruct the user about:

- High intensity light beam. The user must respect the exclusion zone, based on the light beam Hazard Distance (HD).
- Dangerous energy sources inside the projector. The user is not allowed to remove any cover from the projector.
- The installation, maintenance or service is for skilled persons only.
- The requirements for a restricted access location and a restriction zone.

#### **Restricted access location**

To protect untrained persons and children, the projector must be installed in a **restricted access location**. The definition of a **restricted access location** is a location for equipment where both of the following paragraphs apply:

- Access can only be gained by skilled persons (installer or service personnel) or persons who have been
  instructed and trained by a skilled person. The persons must have been instructed about the reasons for
  the restriction applied to the location and about the precautions that shall be taken.
- Access is only possible through the use of the tool or lock and key, or other means of security, and is controlled by the authority responsible for the location.

Why a restricted access location: this is an RG3 product. Based on international requirements, no person is allowed to enter the projected beam within the zone between the projection lens and the related Hazard Distance (HD). This shall be physically impossible by creating sufficient separation height and width or by placing optional barriers. Within the restricted area operator training is considered sufficient. The applicable separation heights and widths are discussed in "High Brightness precautions: Hazard Distance", page 22.

#### **Exclusion zone**

The projector radiates heat on its external surfaces and from ventilation ducts during normal operation. Exposing flammable or combustible materials into close proximity of this projector could result in the spontaneous ignition of that material, resulting in a fire. For this reason, it is absolutely necessary to leave an exclusion zone around all external surfaces of the projector whereby no flammable or combustible materials are present:

• The exclusion zone must not be less than 40 cm (16 in).

## **1.3 Important safety instructions**

#### To prevent the risk of electrical shock

- This projector should be operated from an AC power source. Ensure that the mains voltage and capacity
  matches the projector electrical ratings. If you are unable to install the AC power requirements, contact
  your electrician. Do not defeat the purpose of the grounding.
- Installation should be done according to the local electrical code and regulations by qualified technical personnel only.
- This product is equipped with a 5-terminal barrier strip for the connection of a power line. The projector can run on one of the following configurations, depending on what power system is available:
  - A 3W+N+PE power system (Y configuration).
  - A 3W+PE power system (Δ configuration).
  - A mono phase system with power line with a separate earth ground PE.

If you are unable to install the AC power requirements, contact your electrician. Do not defeat the purpose of the grounding.

- This product is equipped with a 3-terminal barrier strip for the connection of a UPS power cord (2-pole, 3-wire grounding).
- The electronics of the projector (UPS INLET) must be powered from a suitable UPS unit. The building has to be provided with a circuit breaker of max 16A to protect the UPS.
- The building installation has to be provided with a circuit breaker of max 40A to protect the complete unit.
- The circuit breakers are considered as readily accessible disconnect devices that must be incorporated externally to the equipment for removal of the power to the projector mains terminals and UPS inlet terminals.
- The cross-sectional area of the conductors in the power supply cord should be not less than 4 mm<sup>2</sup> (10 AWG) while using a circuit breaker of 40A max. The power cord should have a rating depending on what power system is available:
  - Y configuration: min 500V.
  - Δ configuration: min 300V.
  - Mono phase configuration: min 300V.
- The cross-sectional area of the UPS inlet cord shall be not less than 1.5 mm<sup>2</sup> (14 AWG) and has a rating of minimum 300V.
- In case of using a circuit breaker of a current rating less than 40A, the cross-sectional area of the conductors in the power supply cord must comply with the local electrical code regulations where the projector is installed.
- The cable gland of the power supply cord has a clamping range between 11 mm and 21 mm ( cable diameter of the power supply cord must be in this range :11-21 mm)
- Disconnect the power to the projector mains terminals for removal of all power from the projector.
- Do not allow anything to rest on the power cord. Do not locate this projector where persons will walk on the cord.
- Do not operate the projector with a damaged cord or if the projector has been dropped or damaged until it has been examined and approved for operation by a qualified service technician.
- Position the cord so that it will not be tripped over, pulled, or contact hot surfaces.
- If an extension cord is necessary, a cord with a current rating at least equal to that of the projector should be used. A cord rated for less amperage than the projector may overheat.
- Never push objects of any kind into this projector through cabinet slots as they may touch dangerous voltage points or short circuit parts that could result in a risk of fire or electrical shock.
- Do not expose this projector to rain or moisture.
- Do not immerse or expose this projector in water or other liquids.
- · Do not spill liquid of any kind on this projector.
- Should any liquid or solid object fall into the cabinet, unplug the set and have it checked by qualified service personnel before resuming operations.
- Do not disassemble this projector, always take it to an trained service person when service or repair work is required.
- Do not use an accessory attachment which is not recommended by the manufacturer.
- Lightning For added protection for this video product during a lightning storm, or when it is left unattended and unused for long periods of time, remove all power from the projector. This will prevent damage to the projector due to lightning and AC power-line surges.

#### To prevent personal injury

- To prevent injury and physical damage, always read this manual and all labels on the system before powering the projector or adjusting the projector.
- Do not underestimate the weight of the projector. The projector weighs ±105 kg (±231 lbs). To prevent personal injury a hoisting tool should be used to lift the projector.
- To prevent injury, ensure that the lens, cooling system and all cover plates are correctly installed. See installation procedures.
- Warning: high intensity light beam. NEVER look into the lens ! High luminance could result in damage to the eye.
- Warning: extremely high brightness projector: This projector embeds extremely high brightness (radiance) lasers; this laser light is processed through the projectors optical path. Native laser light is not accessible by the end user in any use case. The light exiting the projection lens has been defused within the optical path, representing a larger source and lower radiance value than native laser light. Nevertheless the projected light represents a significant risk for the human eye when exposed directly within the beam. This risk is not specifically related to the characteristics of laser light but solely to the high thermal induced energy of the light source; which is equivalent to lamp based systems. Thermal retinal eye injury is possible when exposed within the Hazard Distance. The Hazard Distance (HD) is defined from the projection lens surface towards the position of the projected beam where the irradiance equals the maximum permissible exposure as described in the chapter "High Brightness precautions: Hazard Distance", page 22.
- Based on international requirements, no person is allowed to enter the projected beam within the zone between the projection lens and the related Hazard Distance (HD). This shall be made physically impossible by creating sufficient separation height or by placing optional barriers. Within the restricted area operator training is considered sufficient. The applicable separation heights are discussed in "High Brightness precautions: Hazard Distance", page 22.
- The projector shall be installed in a restricted access room equipped with a key or security lock preventing untrained persons entering the Risk Group 3 use zone.
- Switch off the projector before attempting to remove any of the projector's covers.
- Do not place this equipment on an unstable cart, stand, or table. The product may fall, causing serious damage to it and possible injury to the user.
- It is hazardous to operate without lens or shield. Always switch the output light off when replacing a lens.
- Lenses, shields or screens shall be changed if they have become visibly damaged to such an extent that their effectiveness is impaired. For example by cracks or deep scratches.
- The associated Safety responsible of the unit must evaluate the setup before the unit may be started.
- Never point or allow light to be directed on people or reflective objects within the HD zone.
- · All operators shall have received adequate training and be aware of the potential hazards.
- Strictly minimize the number of people who have access to the unit. The unit may never be operated without permission of the responsible for safety.
- Do not put your hand or any body part in front of the beam.
   Do not clean the port window when the projector is switched on.

#### To prevent fire hazard

- Do not place flammable or combustible materials near the projector!
- Barco large screen projection products are designed and manufactured to meet the most stringent safety
  regulations. This projector radiates heat on its external surfaces and from ventilation ducts during normal
  operation, which is both normal and safe. Exposing flammable or combustible materials into close
  proximity of this projector could result in the spontaneous ignition of that material, resulting in a fire. For this
  reason, it is absolutely necessary to leave an "exclusion zone" around all external surfaces of the projector
  whereby no flammable or combustible materials are present. The exclusion zone must be not less than 40
  cm (16") for this projector.
- Do not place any object in the projection light path at close distance to the projection lens output. The concentrated light at the projection lens output may result in damage, fire or burn injuries.
- Ensure that the projector is solidly mounted so that the projection light path cannot be changed by accident.
- Do not cover the projector or the lens with any material while the projector is in operation. Mount the
  projector in a well ventilated area away from sources of ignition and out of direct sun light. Never expose
  the projector to rain or moisture. In the event of fire, use sand, CO<sub>2</sub> or dry powder fire extinguishers. Never
  use water on an electrical fire. Always have service performed on this projector by authorized Barco

service personnel. Always insist on genuine Barco replacement parts. Never use non-Barco replacement parts as they may degrade the safety of this projector.

- Slots and openings in this equipment are provided for ventilation. To ensure reliable operation of the
  projector and to protect it from overheating, these openings must not be blocked or covered. The openings
  should never be blocked by placing the projector too close to walls, or other similar surface. This projector
  should never be placed near or over a radiator or heat register. This projector should not be placed in a
  built-in installation or enclosure unless proper ventilation is provided.
- Projection rooms must be well ventilated or cooled in order to avoid build up of heat. It is necessary to vent hot exhaust air from projector and cooling system to the outside of the building.
- · Let the projector cool completely before storing. Remove cord from the projector when storing.

#### To prevent battery explosion

- Danger of explosion if battery is incorrectly installed.
- Replace only with the same or equivalent type recommended by the manufacturer.
- For disposal of used batteries, always consult federal, state, local and provincial hazardous waste disposal rules and regulations to ensure proper disposal.

#### To prevent projector damage

- The air filters of the projector must be cleaned or replaced on a regular basis. Cleaning the booth area would be monthly-minimum. Neglecting this could result in disrupting the air flow inside the projector, causing overheating. Overheating may lead to the projector shutting down during operation.
- The projector must always be installed in a manner which ensures free flow of air into its air inlets.
- In order to ensure that correct airflow is maintained, and that the projector complies with Electromagnetic Compatibility (EMC) and safety requirements, it should always be operated with all of it's covers in place.
- Slots and openings in the cabinet are provided for ventilation. To ensure reliable operation of the product
  and to protect it from overheating, these openings must not be blocked or covered. The openings should
  never be blocked by placing the product on a bed, sofa, rug, or other similar surface. This product should
  never be placed near or over a radiator or heat register. The device should not be placed in a built-in
  installation or enclosure unless proper ventilation is provided.
- Ensure that nothing can be spilled on, or dropped inside the projector. If this does happen, switch off and remove all power from the projector. Do not operate the projector again until it has been checked by qualified service personnel.
- Do not block the projector cooling fans or free air movement around the projector.
- Proper operation of the projector can only be guaranteed in table mounting (for projector without frame). It is not permitted to use the projector in another position. See installation procedure for correct installation.
- Special care for Laser Beams: Special care should be used when DLP projectors are used in the same room as high power laser equipment. Direct or indirect hitting of collimated laser beams on to the lens from outside the projector body can severely damage the Digital Mirror Devices<sup>™</sup> in which case there is a loss of warranty.
- Never place the projector in direct sunlight. Sunlight on the lens can severely damage the Digital Mirror Devices™ in which case there is a loss of warranty.
- Save the original shipping carton and packing material. They will come in handy if you ever have to ship your equipment. For maximum protection, repack your set as it was originally packed at the factory.
- Remove all power from the projectors mains terminals before cleaning. Do not use liquid cleaners or aerosol cleaners. Use a damp cloth for cleaning. Never use strong solvents, such as thinner or benzine or abrasive cleaners, since these will damage the cabinet. Persistent stains may be removed with a cloth lightly dampened with mild detergent solution.
- To ensure the highest optical performance and resolution, the projection lenses are specially treated with an anti-reflective coating, therefore, avoid touching the lens. To remove dust on the lens, use a soft dry cloth. For lens cleaning follow the instructions precisely as stipulated in the projector manual.
- Rated maximum ambient temperature, t<sub>a</sub>= 40°C (104°F).
- Rated humidity = 5% RH to 85% RH non-condensed.

#### On servicing

- Do not attempt to service this product yourself, as opening or removing covers may expose you to dangerous voltage potentials and risk of electric shock.
- · Refer all servicing to qualified service personnel.

- Attempts to alter the factory-set internal controls or to change other control settings not specially discussed in this manual can lead to permanent damage to the projector and cancellation of the warranty.
- Replacement parts: When replacement parts are required, be sure the service technician has used original Barco replacement parts or authorized replacement parts which have the same characteristics as the Barco original part. Unauthorized substitutions may result in degraded performance and reliability, fire, electric shock or other hazards. Unauthorized substitutions may void warranty.
- Safety check: Upon completion of any service or repairs to this projector, ask the service technician to
  perform safety checks to determine that the product is in proper operating condition.

#### **Malfunction unit**

Remove all power from the projector and refer servicing to qualified service technicians under the following conditions:

- When the power cord or plug is damaged or frayed.
- If liquid has been spilled into the equipment.
- If the product has been exposed to rain or water.
- If the product does not operate normally when the operating instructions are followed. Adjust only those
  controls that are covered by the operating instructions since improper adjustment of the other controls may
  result in damage and will often require extensive work by a qualified technician to restore the product to
  normal operation.
- If the product has been dropped or the cabinet has been damaged.
- If the product exhibits a distinct change in performance, indicating a need for service.



#### On the reinforcement frame


- The Freya reinforcement frame is exclusively designed for the Freya projectors and can thus not be used on other equipment.
- The reinforcement frame is single use. While certain brackets on the frame can be removed in order to remove the front, rear and top cover of the projector, it is not allowed to disassemble the reinforcement frame itself.
- It is not allowed to stack the reinforcement frames of the Freya projector on top of each other, nor is it allowed to suspend them from each other.
- When the projector is suspended from a truss, a minimum of four (4) clamps must be used to secure the
  projector. The clamps must be fixed to the projector frame. Use a truss which is capable of handling five (5)
  times the complete load of the system. Also use clamps that are capable of handling five (5) times the
  complete load of the system.
- It is the responsibility of the installer to suspend the reinforcement frame in a safe and secure fashion. Safety cables must be applied according to local regulations and standards. Safety cables must be dimensioned for the applicable load and no drop distance is allowed or must be limited as much as possible.
- When the safety cables have undergone a heavy shock, invisible damage may have occurred to the safety cables. In this case the safety cables must be replaced.



## **1.5 High Brightness precautions: Hazard Distance**

HD

Hazard Distance (HD) is the distance measured from the projection lens at which the intensity or the energy per surface unit becomes lower than the applicable exposure limit on the cornea or on the skin. The light beam is considered (to be) unsafe for exposure if the distance from a person to the light source is less than the HD.

#### Restriction Zone (RZ) based on the HD


The HD depends on the amount of lumens produced by the projector and the type of lens installed. See chapter "HD in function of modifying optics", page 26.

To protect untrained end users (as cinema visitors, spectators) the installation shall comply with the following installation requirements: Operators shall control access to the beam within the hazard distance or install the product at a height that will prevent spectators' eyes from being in the hazard distance. Radiation levels in excess of the limits will not be permitted at any point less than 2.0 meter (SH) above any surface upon which persons other than operators, performers, or employees are permitted to stand or less than 1.0 meter (SW) lateral separation from any place where such persons are permitted to be. In environments where unrestrained behavior is reasonably foreseeable, the minimum separation height should be greater than or equal to 3.0 meter to prevent potential exposure, for example by an individual sitting on another individual's shoulders, within the HD.

These values are minimum values and are based on the guidance provided in IEC 62471-5:2015 section 6.6.3.5.

The installer and user must understand the risk and apply protective measures based upon the hazard distance as indicated on the label and in the user information. Installation method, separation height, barriers, detection system or other applicable control measure shall prevent hazardous eye access to the radiation within the hazard distance.

For example, projectors that have a HD greater than 1 m and emit light into an uncontrolled area where persons may be present should be positioned in accordance with "the fixed projector installation" parameters, resulting in a HD that does not extend into the audience area unless the beam is at least 2.0 meter above the floor level. In environments where unrestrained behavior is reasonably foreseeable, the minimum separation height should be greater than or equal to 3.0 meter to prevent potential exposure, for example by an individual sitting on another individual's shoulders, within the HD. Sufficiently large separation height may be achieved by mounting the image projector on the ceiling or through the use of physical barriers.



RZ Restriction Zone in the theater


SW Separation Width

Based on national requirements, no person is allowed to enter the projected beam within the zone between the projection lens and the related hazard distance (HD). This shall be physically impossible by creating sufficient separation height or by placing barriers. The minimum separation height takes into account the surface upon which persons other than operator, performers or employees are permitted to stand.

On Image 1-2 a typical setup is displayed. It must be verified if these minimum requirements are met. If required a restricted zone (RZ) in the theater must be established. This can be done by using physical barrier, like a red rope as illustrated in Image 1-2.

The restricted area sticker can be replaced by a sticker with only the symbol.





#### **USA** market

For LIPs (Laser Illuminated Projectors) installed in the USA market other restriction zone conditions apply.

LIPs for installation in restrained environment (cinema theaters, business rooms, class rooms, museums ...) shall be installed at height vertically above the floor such that the bottom plane of the hazard distance zone shall be no lower than 2.5 meters above the floor. Horizontal clearance to the hazard distance zone shall be not less than 1 meter. Alternatively, in case the height of the separation barrier for the horizontal clearance is at least 1 meter high then the horizontal clearance (SW) can be reduced to:

- 0 meter if the height of the hazard zone is minimum 2.5 meter.
- 0.1 meter if the height of the hazard zone is minimum 2.4 meter.
- 0.6 meter if the height of the hazard zone is minimum 2.2 meter.

LIPs for installations in unrestrained environment (concerts, ...) shall be installed at a height vertically above the floor such that the bottom plane of the Hazard distance Zone shall be no lower than 3 meters above the floor. Horizontal clearance to the hazard distance zone shall be not less than 2.5 meters. Any human access horizontally to the Hazard Zone, if applicable, shall be restricted by barriers. If human access is possible in an unsupervised environment, the horizontal or vertical clearances shall be increased to prevent exposure to the hazard distance zone.

The LIP shall be installed by Barco or by a trained and Barco-authorized installer or shall only be transferred to laser light show variance holders. This is applicable for dealers and distributors since they may need to install the LIP (demo install) and/or they transfer (sell, rent, lease) the LIP. Dealers and distributors shall preserve sales and installation records for a period of 5 years. Variance holders may currently hold a variance for production of Class IIIB and IV laser light shows and/or for incorporating RG3 LIPs. Laser light show variance for RG3 LIPs can be requested by mailing the application to RadHealthCustomerService@fda.hhs.gov.

The installation checklist for laser illuminated RG3 projectors must be fully completed after the installation. The installation checklist can be downloaded from the Barco website. The installer shall preserve the checklist for a period of 5 years.

Install one or more readily accessible controls to immediately terminate LIP projection light. The power input at the projector side is considered as a reliable disconnect device. When required to switch off the projector, disconnect the power cord at the projector side. In case the power input at the projector side is not accessible (e.g. truss mount), the socket outlet supplying the projector shall be installed nearby the projector and be easily accessible, or a readily accessible general disconnect device shall be incorporated in the fixed wiring.

## **1.6 HD for fully enclosed projection systems**

#### HD

Hazard Distance (HD) is the distance measured from the projection lens at which the intensity or the energy per surface unit becomes lower than the applicable exposure limit on the cornea or on the skin. The light beam is considered (to be) unsafe for exposure if the distance from a person to the light source is less than the HD.

#### Restriction Zone (RZ) based on the HD

The projector is also suitable for rear projection applications; projecting a beam onto a defuse coated projection screen. As displayed in Image 1-3 two areas should be considered: the restricted enclosed projection area (RA) and the observation area (TH).




Image 1-3

- **RA** Restricted Access location (enclosed projection area).
- PR Projector.
- **TH** Theater (observation area).

- **RZ** Restriction Zone.
- PD Projection Distance.
- SW Separation Width. Must be minimum 1 meter.

For this type of setup 3 different HD shall be considered:

- HD as discussed in "High Brightness precautions: Hazard Distance", page 22, relevant for intrabeam exposure.
- HD<sub>reflection</sub> : the distance that has to be kept restrictive related to the reflected light from the rear projection screen.
- HD<sub>diffuse</sub>: the relevant distance to be considered while observing the diffuse surface of the rear projection screen.

As described in "High Brightness precautions: Hazard Distance", page 22, it is mandatory to create a restricted zone within the beam areas closer than any HD. In the enclosed projection area the combination of two restricted zones are relevant: The restricted zone of the projected beam toward the screen; taking into account 1 meter Separation Width (SW) from the beam onward. Combined with the restricted zone related to the rear reflection from the screen (HD<sub>reflection</sub>); also taking into account a 1 meter lateral separation.


The HD<sub>reflection</sub> distance equals 25% of the difference between the determined HD distance and the projection distance to the rear projection screen. To determine the HD distance for the used lens and projector model see chapter "HD in function of modifying optics", page 26.

#### $HD_{reflection} = 25\%$ (HD - PD)

The light emitted from the screen within the observation shall never exceed the RG2 exposure limit, determined at 10 cm. The  $HD_{diffuse}$  can be neglected if the measured light at the screen surface is below 5000 cd/m<sup>2</sup> or 15000 LUX.

## **1.7 HD in function of modifying optics**

#### **Hazard Distance**



The Freya MKII is the successor of the Freya. Freya MKII has adaptations to the internal lightpath to achieve higher contrast. It is not possible to rebuild a Freya to a Freya MKII.

#### **Physical installation**

#### How to control the projector ?


The projector can be controlled by the local touch screen, via General Purpose inputs and outputs or by browser application.

The projector can have one of several power states, which you can recognize by the state of the power LED.

#### Switching between power states

You can change power state by using one of the following options:

- Pressing the Power button on the Cinema Controller (reference 1) ٠
- Sending a wake-up signal to the GPI3 input for more than 0.5 seconds, but less than 2 (reference 2).1 •
- Using the ECO menu on the touch display (if available). ٠
- Using the Power menu in Web Communicator.

<sup>1.</sup> GPI3 works the same way as the power button. Thus take into account that sending a signal for more than 6 seconds will turn the projector OFF instead.




Image 2–2 Location of the Power button and GPI 1-4 input on the Cinema Controller.

#### Power state diagram




Image 2–3 Power State diagram

## **2.2 Switching the projector ON**

#### Possible ways to switch on

There are multiple ways to switch on the projector, depending on a few factors:

#### How to switch on locally, using the touch display?

- 1. Ensure that the Freya projector is installed onto a stable platform.
- 2. Ensure the projector is correctly connected to the mains power.
- 3. Ensure that the correct lens is installed for your application.
- 4. Press the power button to switch the projector ON.

The projector will start up and the touch display will start its initialization procedure.

- 5. Wait until the *Projector control* menu is fully accessible on the touch display.
  - *Tip:* While the menu may become accessible early on, certain icons (e.g. the Light button) may be greyed out until the projector is ready to play.

6. Press the Light button to activate the light source. Use a press of >1 second.

The Light source will prepare itself for playing, by doing a laser self-test. This may take a while, depending on your projector variant. While the light source is turning on, the Light button will blink green. Once completed it will be full green.

7. Press the **Dowser** button to open the dowser.

5. On the Eco mode page, press Wake up.

The projector will start up. Once it has fully started up, you will be redirected to the login page of Web Communicator.

- Once the login page becomes available, log in to the projector.
   Once logged in, you will be redirected to the *Light, dowser, lens* menu.
- In this menu, press the Light button to activate the light source. Use a press of >1 second. The Light source will start warming up.
- 8. Press the **Dowser** button to open the dowser.

#### How to switch on remotely, using only GPI3?

- 1. Ensure that the Freya projector is installed onto a stable platform.
- 2. Ensure the projector is correctly connected to the mains power.
- 3. Ensure that the correct lens is installed for your application.
- 4. Ensure that the GPI port is connected to a supported automation controller (e.g. a JNIOR device).
- 5. Send a signal to GPI3 for more than 0.5 seconds (but less than six seconds).

*Tip:* GPI3 works in a similar fashion to the power button. So sending a signal for six seconds or more will force the projector OFF instead.

CAUTION: See the User Guide of the projector to operate and control the projector.

#### How to connect?

- 1. On the touch display of the projector, press either *About*, or *Settings* to see the IP address assigned to the projector.
- 2. Use a web browser to browse to the assigned IP address. The login page of Web Communicator will be displayed.
- 3. Log in onto Web Communicator.

For security reasons, it is advised to change these passwords as soon as possible after your projector has been configured.

## 2.4 Switching the projector OFF

Putting the projector in ECO mode is thé preferred method of shutting down the projector after a day of playing. Only switch the projector to OFF if technical problems have occurred. Take into account that you can **not** start the projector remotely when the projector has been switched OFF. You can only power it using the power button.

#### How to put the projector in ECO mode, using the touch display?

1. In the main menu of the touch display, press on the ECO button.





Image 2-7 Example of the ECO menu on the touch display

#### How to put the projector in ECO mode, using the Web Communicator?

- 1. In the Communicator, browse to *Control* >> *Power*.
- 2. In the Power menu, press Switch to ECO mode and confirm.



#### How to turn the projector OFF?

1. Press the power button for more than six seconds. The projector will go to OFF mode.

or

Send a signal via GPI3 for more than six second. The projector will go to OFF mode.

## 2.5 Operation in 24/7 Mode

#### General

When the projector is destined to be operated continuously 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, the following recommendations should be followed:

Twice a day, switch off the projector during two minutes by using the power button. The power down action
will automatically and invisibly trigger a grey test pattern running within the projector.

Apply moving video content as much as possible, with on average a level of 50% white (long-term use of
extreme black or white content could potentially cause accelerated aging).

## 2.6 Web Communicator

#### **Built-in web application**

The Web Communicator application is a uniquely powerful and easy to use built-in web application for the Barco projector. This application provides all the necessary tools necessary to setup and control the connected projector. A comprehensive array of easy to access menu pages provide the projectors digital input, output and screen display via a combination of simple buttons and displays.

The Web Communicator user interface is readily available on the projector without any additional software installation. It is accessible via a web browser and is fully supported on iOS and Android devices.




Image 2-9 Example of the Web Communicator tool

#### Quick and Easy configuration

Clearly indicated tab pages allow the control of Projector connection, configuration, test, color calibration and configuration with an existing automation system. All actions can be activated by a simple click. Depending on the user level, functions are enabled or disabled in the application. The enabled functions are only accessible via a password entry and that prevents misalignment once everything is correctly aligned.

This chapter describes the actions a user is allowed to do with the ICMP-X. This includes configuring the ICMP-X, removing and installing HDDs, resetting the ICMP-X and checking the status lights.

## 3.1 ICMP-X configuration via Web Communicator

## About ICMP-X configuration

Following parameters are available to configure the ICMP-X:

- Global settings: allows defining name of the ICMP-X, host name (network identifier) and IP address which can be used for communication with external content devices.
- · User settings: definition of all users allowed on the ICMP-X.
- · Server settings: definition of access to servers and storage libraries of content (movies, KDM, etc.).
- · Player settings: Audio delay and audio output frequency.
- Audio channel: allows defining the mapping of audio channels (content) on each audio output (AES outputs of the ICMP-X.).
- Scheduler setting: Enable/Disable scheduler at startup, delays allowed in scheduler mode and length of schedule history.
- Devices: allows defining communication ports settings, to access external devices controlled by the automation.
- Automation Cues: event cues that are triggered from different sources and to which can be assigned actions to be executed by the automation engine.
- Verify internal clock of the ICMP-X.



All installation and maintenance operations on the ICMP-X are performed via Web Communicator, the Barco configuration software. Please refer to the user guide for further information.

## About Default settings

The restore of factory setting is a feature that allows removing all settings performed on the ICMP-X and replaces them with the default values set at the factory. Please refer to the Communicator user guide for further information.

## About the ICMP-X internal clock


The crystal on the ICMP-X board that manages the clock shows a certain drift (all crystals do). With the Communicator the internal clock can be adjusted. This maintenance action should be repeated every 3 months. When neglected the system will locks up.

It is possible to enable NTP (Network Time Protocol). You have to configure (at installation) an IP address where the ICMP-X can find a sync signal. From then on, and as long as the connection is active, the ICMP-X will automatically keep its clock correct. For detailed instructions see user guide.



When entering a new HDD in an ICMP-X, the HDD RAID LED will be full red for a short time. This is not an error, the HDD has not yet been "recognized" by the projector and ICMP-X.







This procedure assumes that the HDD slot of the ICMP is empty. If not, see procedure "Removing a HDD from the ICMP-X", page 41.



**CAUTION:** Always use a new empty spare part HDD approved by Barco to replace a malfunction HDD. Do not use a HDD from another ICMP HDD set.



**CAUTION:** Always make sure that all HDDs in the ICMP HDD set have the same storage capacity. See label on top of the HDD to know the storage capacity.

## How to install a HDD ?

- 1. Ensure that the projector is switched off.
- 2. Prepare the HDD for insertion by moving the latch towards the left and push the unlock button to open the handle.



3. Insert the HDD into the HDD slot. Ensure that the handle is sufficiently open so that the hook (reference 1) of the handle can pass the front plate of the ICMP



4. Push the HDD completely and firmly inside its slot, close the handle, and move the latch towards the right.



5. Switch on the projector.

Even if you replace only one HDD (e.g. degraded mode), the projector must be switched off. The ICMP automatically starts with the RAID recovery process when the projector will be switched on. The red LED of the HDD which has to be rebuilt is blinking. This process takes about 200 GB per hour. Once the RAID is completed the red LED turns off.

**CAUTION:** It's strongly recommended to complete the RAID recovery process prior to starting a show. This to ensure that the content integrity is preserved and that the show is not interrupted.

## 3.6 ICMP-X reset

## **ICMP-X** reset possibilities

- The Reboot ICMP-X reset button in the GUI of the Web Communicator.
- The ICMP-X reset button in the GUI of the Web Commander.
- The ICMP-X hardware reset button located on the front panel of the ICMP-X (Not recommended, use only when all other reset possibilities are exhausted!)

## How to reset the ICMP-X?

1. click on the Reboot ICMP-X button in the GUI of the Web Communicator (recommended).

or

Click on the ICMP-X reset button in the GUI of the Web Commander.

As a result the projector is safely prepared for the ICMP reboot. All ongoing events on the ICMP-X (e.g. ingest) are requested to end. After a few seconds the ICMP-X is requested to restart. The READY LED on the front panel of the ICMP-X starts to blink orange.


Once the READY LED lit continuous green the ICMP-X is up and running.

- 2. Did the reset of the ICMP-X fail?
  - If yes, perform a hardware reset as follows:
  - 1. switch off the light source of the projector.
  - 2. press the ICMP-X hardware reset button a few seconds (reference 3 Image 3-10).



*Warning:* Resetting the ICMP-X with the hardware reset button may cause damage to the content on the HDDs. A re-configuration of the whole system may be required!

As a result the projector is safely prepared for the ICMP-X reboot. All ongoing events on the ICMP-X (e.g. ingest) are stopped immediately and the ICMP-X restarts.



**WARNING:** Resetting the ICMP-X with the hardware reset button may cause damage to the content on the HDDs. A re-configuration of the whole system may be required!

## 4.1 Graphical User Interface

#### Overview

The user interface is organized around a *Menu* bar (reference 1), a *Status* bar (reference 2) and a working area (reference 3). Working area varies depending on the page in use. A *Side* bar (reference 4) always located at the left of the working area indicates in highlight the name of the current page.

## Menu bar

In the Web Communicator application, the *Menu* bar is always present regardless of the displayed page.

Auditorium name, date and time (reference 1) are displayed next to Barco logo. For more details concerning Auditorium name, please refer to chapter "Network configuration", page 278. For more details concerning date and time adjustment, please refer to chapter "Internal clock settings", page 185.

When the Auditorium name has been entered correctly, it is always available in the menu bar near the Barco logo, even when you are not logged in.

The general menu (reference 2) allows to reach all available pages of the application. An overview of the menu tree is available in section "Application Menu tree", page 62.

*Web Commander* shortcut (reference 3) allows to run WebCommander, the web application provided by Barco to control ICMP (Integrated Cinema Media Processor). Only available when the projector is equipped with an ICMP. For more details please refer to ICMP user guide.

*Dashboard* shortcut (reference 4) allows to display a dashboard that provide general overview of all projectors located on the local network. For more details concerning dashboard panel, please refer to "Dashboard", page 59.

*User* icon (reference 5) located at right is followed by the current user name. Click on this icon to open a short menu dedicated to account settings and logout. For more details concerning this menu, please refer to "Modifying account settings (password)", page 56.



## Status bar


In the Web Communicator application, the *Status* bar is always present regardless of the displayed page.

Status icons (reference 1) provide information on the respective status of the dowser, the light source and the test pattern. Click on these icons to directly change these status, just like commands provided in *Control* > *Projector* > *Light, dowser, lens* menu. For more details concerning status icons, please refer to chapter "Light, dowser, lens", page 71.

Multi-projector status icon (reference 2) lets you know if the projector is operating in multi-projector mode and if it is master (icon that represents a crown) or a slave (icon that represents a chain). Click on this icon to directly access to *Configuration* > *System access* > *Multi projectors* and modify multi projector settings.

Name of the last executed macro is displayed in the status bar (reference 3). Click on this macro name to directly reach *Configuration* > *Projector* > *Macros*, the panel that allows manage the macros of the projector. If the current user have limited rights (no access to configuration panels), click on this macro name allows to only reach *Control* > *Projector* > *Macros*, the panel that allows activate a macros of the projector. Note that nothing is displayed on the status bar if no macro has been run.

Notification icons (reference 4) located at the bottom right corner indicate the number of *error* notifications (in red) and the number of *warning* notifications (in yellow). Click on these icons allows to display the notification list (*Diagnostics > Monitoring > Notifications*). For more details concerning notifications, please refer to chapter "Notifications", page 309.




## Side bar

The Side bar allows direct access to other pages located in the current sub section.

Name of the current page is highlighted (reference 1).

The name of the sub section where the active page is located is displayed on the top (reference 2).

You can hide the Side bar by left-clicking on the Side bar while holding the **<ESC>** key.

## Special GUI behavior on a limited screen area

When Web communicator is used in small window or when it runs on a device with a restricted display (e.g. a smart phone), a space-saving mechanism is automatically activated. The general menu is no longer displayed in the *Menu* bar. It is replaced by a collapsed menu icon (*hamburger* icon) located to the right side of the *Menu* bar (reference 1).

Click on the cross (reference 4) to close the menu.

## Available list actions

Many pages of the application are based on a list of elements (reference 1) with slider (reference 2). A series of tools located at the top of the list (reference 3) makes it easy to sort or retrieve these items.

## 4.2 Starting up

## **Prerequisites**

The device has direct access to the projector LAN via Ethernet cable or Wifi, or it has open access via Internet.

## How to start up

- **1.** Start a web Browser (Google Chrome, Mozilla Firefox ...).
- 2. Set the web application URL provided by the Cinema controller. The URL is composed of the HTTPS tag and the address of projector (e.g. https:// 150.158.252.210). The HTTPS (Hypertext Transfer Protocol Secure) communication protocol is used for security reasons. For more detail concerning HTTPS protocol and potential issues encountered with the SSL certificate, see "Installing SSL certificate to enable HTTPS protocol", page 50. Refer to the projector's installation manual for more information concerning the addressing of the cinema controller.

- **3.** Sign in using user name (reference 1) and password (reference 2) then push on Login button (reference 3).

*Note:* Web Communicator is equipped with an auto logout mechanism that locks the application after a period of inactivity. Select the "Keep me logged in" checkbox to disable the auto-logout functionality.

Once logged, the landing page is displayed. By default this is the page dedicated to triggering the main projector controls (*Control > Projector > Light, dowser, lens*). The landing page may vary depending on the user and the rights given to him. Depending on these rights, some parts of the application are accessible or blocked. For more details, please see the chapter dedicated to user rights in the next sections.

# 4.3 Installing SSL certificate to enable HTTPS protocol

#### **Overview**

The HTTPS protocol (HyperText Transfer Protocol Secure) is the secure version of HTTP protocol which is the primary protocol used to send data between a web browser and a website. HTTPS is encrypted in order to increase security of data transfer (no information is passed in plain text). This type of security system uses public/private keys to encrypt communications between two parties and requires the use of a valid SSL (Secure Sockets Layer) certificate. The SSL certificate need to be downloaded from the projector web site and

manually installed on the web browser. Once the SSL certificate is installed the HTTPS protocol is enabled and the future connections will be established automatically as long as the certificate is valid.

## Connection error related to invalid or missing SSL certificate

One of the most common error encountered with the HTTPS protocol is "*your connection is not private*" error. The browser finds that there is a problem with the security protocol and it will automatically try to prevent you from reaching the site. This feature is built into web browsers to protect the user.

The way an error appears can vary a bit, depending on what browser you're using.






This issue will appear when the SSL certificate is not installed or is invalid. The HTTPS communication couldn't be established and it is necessary to consider installing a new certificate. Bypassing security and only using the HTTP protocol for your communication with the projector is not recommended.

Even if you do have an SSL certificate installed on your browser, there can be several reasons why the browser doesn't recognize the validity of this certificate. It is often a problem with the validity period. The certificate has a limited life period (2 years max) and it has expired. Or it is also possible that the settings on which the certificate is based have changed. For example, when the "Hostname" or "domain" values in the projector's network configuration are changed by the administrator, a new certificate is automatically calculated.

## How to download the SSL certificate in Windows using Chrome browser

1. Open a chrome browser and enter the portal url with *https* tag since its secured network (reference 1).



## 4.4 Reset administrator password

#### About administrator password reset

In its factory configuration, the projector has a default password associated to the default admin user. If for any reason the administrator lost this password, there is no way to recover it.

The only way to resolve this situation is following the procedure to reset the administrator password. Procedure is based on principal of public and private keys pair. The administrator needs provide challenge code to the help desk that will send response code based on this code and the projector serial number.

#### How to reset administrator password

1. Click on "Forgot password?" in the *login* page.





## About this chapter

After you have physically installed the projector, you can start with the configuration process. This chapter gives an overview of all the different stages in the configuration process which you have to follow to get your projector up and running. Each stage is briefly described and refers to more detailed step by step procedures in this manual.

Use this process overview as a checklist to ensure that all stages have been followed in the configuration process of the projector.

## **5.1 Prerequisites**

### Overview

Prerequisites may vary depending on the projector model to install. The list of prerequisites provided here is indicative. For more information on each prerequisite, please consult the installation manual of the projector.

## List of prerequisites

The following prerequisites must be met before you start configuring the projector:

- The projector must be physically installed as written in the installation manual of this projector.
- Make sure the projector is connected to the power net via the mains or via a UPS.
- The appropriate lens must be installed in the projector lens holder, with or without lens adapter (depending on the projector type).
- Install optional peripherals, systems and devices (e.g. the exhaust adapter or the HDDs of the ICMP-X).

## **5.2 Process overview**



This high level overview briefly describes all process stages that need to be done in a chronological order to configure the projector in a correct way using the Web Communicator. This overview does not include the physical installation process. For that refer to the installation manual of the projector.

## **Projector configuration process**

- 1. Check if all prerequisites are fulfilled. For more info see chapter "Prerequisites", page 66.
- 2. Switch on the projector.
- Auditorium name and network configuration. Fill in network configuration in order to interact properly with the projector via local network, and give a relevant auditorium name to easily identify it. Network configuration could be adjusted manually, or automatically via DHCP server. For more information concerning these settings see chapter "Network configuration", page 278.
- Load a clone package corresponding to the projector type and related to the chosen configuration (e.g. clone package is different if the projector is equipped with an ICMP-X or an ICP-D). See chapter "Backup and restore", page 325.
- 5. Activate and calibrate the lens installed in the lens holder. Article number of the used lens must be identified in the lens list and activated, then an automatic calibration must be perform to detect reference points and middle position. See "Activating a lens", page 115 and "Calibrating a lens", page 116
- 6. Switch on the light source. See "Light Source on-off", page 72.
- 7. Open the Dowser. See "Dowser open-close", page 73.
- 8. Display a test pattern on the screen. Select a test pattern that allows you to perform *Flat* and *Scope* format settings.(e.g. *Framing\_uncorrected* testpattern).For more info concerning how to select test pattern, please see "Activating a test pattern using the control menu", page 77.
- Testing the limits of the lens. By using Zoom, Shift and Focus buttons, check if both flat and scope formats of pictures can fit into the screen with the current lens. For more info see procedures "Lens zoom", page 74, "Lens shift", page 74 and "Lens focus", page 74.



*Tip:* High accuracy is not necessary during this test. The goal is to quickly test lens limits.



*Note:* Not being able to do one of the next steps means that you have to realize a back focus alignment directly on the lens, or the lens selected model is not suitable to this configuration.

10. Creating the lens position files. Now that the limits of the lens have been tested, we can save the lens positions for *Flat* and *Scope* formats. As described in the previous step, fit the image to the screen for the *Flat* format, then save the active configuration in file named Flat. Repeat the same operation with *Scope* format (save in file named Scope). See procedure "Creating a lens position file", page 119.



*Tip:* It is recommended to create a slightly larger picture (2 or 3 pixels) to facilitate masking step that will come later.



*Note:* If needed, files dedicated to supplemental formats could also be created here (alternative contents with subtitles, ...).

**11. Creating the screen files.** These files contain information about screen presentation configuration like resizing, letterboxing, masking and lens factor.

Follow this procedure to create file related to *Flat* format, then repeat the same procedure to create the file related to *Scope* format. For more information, see "Creating a screen file", page 160.

- 12. Creating the input files (optional). These files contain information about input configuration. This step is optional. By default input files are loaded with clone package. For more information concerning these settings see "Creating an input file", page 146.
- 13. Perform a white point calibration. See "White point calibration", page 204.
- 14. Perform Color calibration for all formats (see "Creating a new MCGD file", page 208) then verify (see "Verifying the colors after correction", page 211).
- **15. Perform Light sensor calibration** for all formats (Scope, Flat, 3D...). See "Creating a new light sensor calibration file", page 193.
- 16. Creating the macros. Macro needs to be (automatically) executed before each show in order to set projector with correct parameter values related to the show. For more information see procedure "Creating a new macro", page 89.
- Linking the macros to preset buttons. Macro could be executed by clicking on preset button accessible on touch display located on *Input & Communication* side of the projector. See "Linking a macro to preset button", page 99.
- 18. Creating a profile fit for each user acting with the projector. See "Creating a user", page 287.
- **19. Creating the marriage PIN codes**. It is recommended to create a PIN code for each user supposed to perform a marriage operation between Mediablock and projector. For more info see chapter "Marriage pin code", page 290.











This menu is used to schedule the automatic switch on (Wake-up) and shutdown (switch to ECO mode) of the projector.

The scheduler allows an overview on one entire week. The date of the week is displayed on the top (reference 1).

One column represents a day of the week. Slots in the day are represented by rectangles (one slot each half hour).

The vertical axis is graduated in hours. Use the scroll bar located on the right side to display the rest of the day if needed.

A blue line indicates the current time. The area located temporally before this line (reference 5) is grayed. No further action is possible on time slots located in the grayed area (in the past). Only slots located after this line, in clear area (reference 6) are accessible.

Following actions are available in this menu:

- Left Arrow (reference 2) moves the week view for one week to the left (the previous week).
- **Right Arrow** (reference 3) moves the week view for one week to the right (the next week).
- Today (reference 4) allows to display a view of the scheduler centralize on the current day.
- Click on a slot located after the current time displays a popup (reference 8) that allow to set an automatic switch on (reference 7) or an automatic shutdown (reference 9) of the projector. The time of triggering of an action can be modified (reference 10) and automatically repeated in the week by checking one or several days of the week in the *"recurrent days "section* (reference 11).
- Remove a shutdown (Go to ECO) or a switch on (Wake-up) already present by clicking on it.

Once automatic switch on (reference 14) and shutdown (reference 15) of the projector are fixed, the areas located between a *Go to ECO* and the next *Wake-up* are turn in green hatched area (reference 16). The projector will be in ECO mode in this period without possibility to play.



This panel allows to manage macros of the projector.



Each macro displayed here has a *title* (reference 1). If a macro is associated with a preset button (projector keypad), the *preset number* (reference 2) is specified on the macro. For more details concerning link to preset buttons, please refer to chapter "Linking a macro to preset button", page 99.

Click on a macro (reference 4) in this list allows to show it in its expanded form and displays a contextual menu.

Following actions are available in this menu:

- Save as cue (reference 5) allows to create a cue on the ICMP.
- **Execute** (reference 6) allows to activate the macro. During its execution, the *status* of the macro (reference 3) turns to *BUSY*. When the macro is completed, the *status* of the macro (reference 3) turns to *EXECUTED*.
- Export (reference 7) creates a downloadable backup package.
- Link/Unlink to preset (reference 8) allows to link or unlink the macro with preset button of the projector keypad.
- Edit (reference 9) allows to modify the macro.
- Rename (reference 10) allows to modify the name of the macro.
- Delete (reference 11) allows to remove the macro from the list.

Clicking on menu (reference 12) displays the macro general menu.

Following actions are available in this menu:

• New (reference 13) allows to create a new empty macro.

- **New from active state** (reference 14) allows to create a new macro pre-filled with commands corresponding to current projector state.
- Import (reference 15) allows to import macro.
- Export (reference 16) creates a downloadable backup package that contains all macro files selected in the list.
- Delete (reference 17) allows to remove selected macro files from the list..




#### About Macro editor

Use the *Macro editor* to create or modify macros. This page is not directly accessible via a general menu. Click **Edit** to modify a macro in a contextual menu (reference 1) or click **New** in the macro general menu to create a new macro (reference 2). For more information, please consult the sections dedicated to these operations in chapter "Macros configuration", page 88.

The *Macro editor* consists of a commands set distributed in several tabs (reference 3) and an ordered list of commands (reference 4). List of commands is empty when it's a creation of a new macro.

The following actions are available:

- add commands from the command set to the list.
- delete some commands out of the list.
- change the order of the commands in the list.
- edit commands attributes.





## **About Macros**

A macro is a saved sequence of *commands* that can be stored and then easily recalled.

A macro can contain at least:

- an input file
- a screen file
- a PCF file
- a 3D file
- a 2D MCGD file
- a light sensor calibration file
- a lens position file

A macro can be executed in one of the following:

- Click **Execute** directly on the concerned macro in *Control > Projector > Macros*.
- If macro is associated with preset, click on preset button (touch display located on *Input & Communication* side of the projector).
- If the rights of the user are not limited to *Show manager* level, click **Execute** in the contextual menu of the concerned macro in *Configuration > Projector > Macros*.

#### About Commands

Commands are basic actions used to trigger mechanisms or features of the projector. Some commands can be relatively basic, such as opening the dowser, associating an action with a general purpose output, or displaying a pattern. Others, more complex, use settings files to apply specific presets (modify the colorimetry, switch in 3D mode ...).

Commands are grouped by theme in several tabs. The following commands tabs are available:

- Configurations
- Test pattern
- Output

Some commands require additional parameters such as channel number, pulse duration for GPIO or the name of the parameter file to be used by the command. These additional actions are performed by clicking **Edit** located to the right of each command in the command list

## 7.1.4.2 Adding a command to a macro


#### What is possible

Commands list can be completed by new ones, directly selected in the commands set located to the right of the panel. The command can be added at the end of the list (click **Move**) or drag and dropped directly to the right location in the list.

Until now a 3D configuration file contained data needed to display a 3D movie with a specific frame rate. And it was necessary to repeat the creation process for each frame rate multiplication (24, 48, 60).

From version 1.2 or higher, it is still possible to work this way but this is no longer the normal process. The creation and management of 3D configuration files has been slightly modified.

Now, during creation process, it is no longer one file that is added to the 3D file list but four: a first file with the common parameters (\_auto) and three additional files with the parameters dedicated to the different frame rates (24, 48, 60).

These files could be edited separately but system takes care to maintain consistency between files. By example, if user change L/R Input Reference of one file (e.g. RealD\_48), that settings will be saved. But, while editing the RealD\_auto file, a setting mismatch warning will be displayed on GUI (reference 1).



# 7.5.3.3 Dark time adjustment

# **Dark Time Adjustment**

Between switching the frames the image needs to be black the same time the external devices need to switch (external devices can be 3D Glasses, or polarizing filter).

For 3D applications, systems typically need a period of time where the image projected on the screen is black. This black or "dark time" is used to switch the mechanism that controls what a viewers left eye and right eye sees. This software command is used to adjust the projector dark time to meet the requirements of whatever switching mechanism is being used.

3D dark time adjustment will be disabled (set to 0) whenever 3D is disabled. With 3D enabled and 3D dark time adjustment disabled, the projector will be set to its default dark time of approximately 388  $\mu$ s. There is no dark time when 3D is disabled.

The system will have a minimum and maximum dark time that can be achieved. If the specified value is smaller than the system can provide, the dark time will be set to the systems minimum value, which will be reported as the actual dark time value. If the specified value is larger than the system can provide, the dark time will be set to the systems maximum value, which will be reported as the actual dark time value.

For 3D applications, systems typically need a period of time where the image projected on the screen is black. This black or "dark time" is used to switch the mechanism that controls what a viewers left eye and right eye sees. For most 3D applications, the system will provide an output reference signal that indicates whether left or right eye data is being displayed, as well as the start of dark time. This signal is the 3D L/R Output Reference.





### **Output Reference Delay**

The output reference delay shifts the output reference signal. That results in the best 3D viewing with the least possible crosstalk between eyes.

Delay value from Delay – Time is added to the nominal timing between the displayed dark time and the 3D L/R Output Reference.





If you require corrective lenses to see a cinema screen clearly, be sure you have them available.









Image 7–91 Right eye delay test content

# Auto switch delay time

When playing a 3D contents, the ICMP and ICP-D can automatically detect the frame rate of the played content and configure the frame rate multiplicator accordingly.

That feature simplifies the show creation by allowing the exhibitor to use a single macro whatever the frame rate of the content (additional macro to handle the content's aspect ratio differences are still needed).

This Auto adjustment can be activated by using the *name\_auto.3D* in the Macro.

When this file is activated, the ICMP or ICP-D will check the frame rate played and will activate 3d settings such as *Dark time adjustment* and *Output reference delay* contained in the other files such as *name\_24.3D*.

The selection of the file used will be based on the following table:

#### How to delete several input files

1. While in *Configuration* > *Projector* > *Input*, click **Select All** (reference 1) and use the check boxes (reference 2) located at right of the input files in order to select/deselect the files you want to delete.





Each screen file displayed here has a *name* (reference 1). Creation date (reference 2) of the file is displayed just under its name. When a screen file is activated the status (reference 3) turns to *Active* and its name is noticed on top of the list.

Clicking on a screen file (reference 4) in this list allows to show it in its expanded form and displays a contextual menu.

Following actions are available in this menu:

- Activate (reference 5) allows to activate the screen file.
- Export (reference 6) creates a downloadable backup package.
- Edit (reference 7) allows to modify the screen file.
- Rename (reference 8) allows to rename the screen file.
- **Delete** (reference 9) allows to remove the screen file from the list.

Clicking on menu (reference 10) displays the screen file general menu.

Following actions are available in this menu:

- New (reference 11) allows to create a new screen file.
- Import (reference 12) allows to import a screen file.
- Export (reference 13) creates a downloadable backup package that contains all screen files selected in the list.
- Delete (reference 14) allows to remove several screen files selected in the list.



## 7.7.3 Screen file editor

#### About this chapter

This chapter contains all the necessary information to use screen file editor, the Web Communicator page used to create or modify screen files.

### 7.7.3.1 Cropping (active area)

#### What is cropping

Realize "cropping" means define an active area.

The active area within a source frame equals the relevant movie information within the movie stream. E.g. :  $1280 \times 1024$  movie can be mastered in a  $1920 \times 1080$  stream. Only the  $1280 \times 1024$  frame contains the relevant movie information. In this case, the active area is  $1280 \times 1024$ .

The most frequently used active areas are predefined behind shortcuts (e.g. 2K Scope).



The list of predefined shortcuts may be different depending on the type of projector (e.g. 4K shortcut is not present on 2K series projectors).

#### How to crop

1. While in screen file editor, click Cropping (reference 1).





- If you need a predefined active area, click on a shortcut at the right hand of the window (reference 2).
   *Width* (reference 5) and *Height* (reference 6) are settled with predefined values.
   For a dedicated active area, continue with the next steps.
- 3. Click on the slider of *Width* (reference 5) and *Height* (reference 6) and drag to set up the active area.

or

click on **plus** button or **minus** button of *Width* (reference 5) and *Height* (reference 6) to set up the active area.

or

click in the input field of *Width* (reference 5) and *Height* (reference 6), select the current value and enter a new value with the keyboard to set up the active area.

4. Click on the slider of *X*-offset (reference 3) and *Y*-offset (reference 4) and drag to set the offset.

or

click on **plus** button or **minus** button of *X-offset* (reference 3) and *Y-offset* (reference 4) to set up the offset.

or

click in the input field of *X*-offset (reference 3) and *Y*-offset (reference 4), select the current value and enter a new value with the keyboard to set the offset.

The offset is referring to the center of the active area and to the center of the source frame.




Image 7–133 Center offset indication

### 7.7.3.2 Scaling

#### What is scaling

With the scaling tool it is possible to adapt the projected image on the screen size (defining the area available for image display). So, look always to the screen when scaling the image. The projector will always attempt to keep the image centered within this defined area, and the correct aspect ratio of the image will always be preserved.



As the projector project an image under an angle, the original image will be shown as trapezium. The image will be squared with the masking function by masking the shaded areas.

#### How to scale

1. While in *screen file editor*, click **Scaling** (reference 1).



- 2. Select a Test pattern (reference 2) to display a test pattern on screen.
- 3. Enable or disable **letterbox** (reference 3) to determine how the image will be displayed. Enabled **letterbox** allows to preserve the film's original aspect ratio. For more details see section dedicated to letterbox after this procedure.
- 4. Set the position the *Top-Left* corner and *Bottom-Right* corner by using numeric values. Position the four corners of the picture on the four corners of the screen.
  - 1. Click in the input fields for X and Y of *Top-Left* corner (reference 4) and fill out the desired position value (or use up down control of spin box near the input field).
  - 2. Redo the same operation with the *Bottom-Right* corner (reference 7). *Top-Right* corner (reference 5) and *Bottom-Left* corner (reference 6) cannot be modified: these fields are automatically updated depending on the actions on the other two fields.

or

Set the position the 4 corners manually by using arrows (reference 9):

- 1. Click on *Top-Left* corner (reference 8) to select it, then use up/down/left/right arrows (reference 9) to reach the desired position.
- 2. Redo the same operation with the Bottom-Right corner.



*Tip:* Combination of theses arrows with [SHIFT] or [ALT] keys on keyboard allows to optimizing positioning. See following section dedicated to *positioning accelerator*.

- 5. Click **Discard** (reference 10) allows to remove all the modifications done in the previous step.
- 6. Click Restore (reference 11) allows to reset the scaling (zero position).

#### **Positioning accelerator**

Manually positioning corners could be fastidious, especially if the new position is far to the previous one. To avoid this, some keyboard combination are available to accelerate positioning.

To speed up the positioning by factor of x10, use up/down/left/right arrows on the screen in combination with the **[SHIFT]** key on the keyboard. With this combination the displacements will be 10 pixels for each click.

To speed up the positioning by factor of x100, use up/down/left/right arrows on the screen in combination with the **[ALT]** key on the keyboard. With this combination the displacements will be 100 pixels for each click.



Another way to optimize movement during positioning is push on one up/down/left/right arrows on the screen but not release (stay pressed). This action allows to obtain a displacement with speed that increased until release.

### Letterbox

The letterbox function determines how the image will be displayed.

If Letterbox enabled is checked, the system will show all of the original image data on the screen. This may require that the system letterbox the image, either on the top and bottom, or left and right side.

If Letterbox enabled is not checked, the system will fill all the screen with image data. This may require that the system discard image data, either from the top and bottom, or the left and right side.

The following two examples show what will be displayed based on the state of the letterbox function.





  - Input image is not scaled, however, data at the top of the image must be discarded because it falls
    outside of the resized area, and data at the bottom of the image must be discarded because it falls

#### 7.7.3.3 Masking

#### What is masking

After resizing the image, it may be still need to mask away pixels on the screen due to keystone and/or bow distortion of the projected image. So look always at the screen while masking pixels.

#### How to mask

1. While in screen file editor, click Masking (reference 1).



- 2. Select a **Test pattern** (reference 2) to display a test pattern on screen.
- **3.** If you need a predefined shape of masking, click on a shortcut (reference 14) at the right of the screen representation.

- Set the position the 4 corners by using numeric values. Fit the corners of the picture on the four corners of the screen by blanking the pixels displayed outside of the screen.
  - 1. Click in the input fields for X and Y of *Top-Left* corner (reference 3) and fill out the desired position value (or use up down control of spin box near the input field).
  - 2. Redo the same operation with the other corners: *Top-Right* corner (reference 4), *Bottom-Right* corner (reference 5), *Bottom-Left* corner (reference 6).

or

Set the position the 4 corners manually by using arrows (reference 13):

- 1. Click on a corner (e.g. reference 11) to select it, then use up/down/left/right arrows (reference 13) to reach the desired position.
- 2. Redo the same operation with the other corners.



*Tip:* Combination of theses arrows with [SHIFT] or [ALT] keys on keyboard allows to optimizing positioning. See section dedicated to *positioning accelerator* in "Scaling", page 163.

- 5. Set the 4 sides alignment by using numeric values. Fit the four sides of the picture to the four sides of the screen by blanking the pixels displayed outside of the screen. This setting is mainly used on curve screens.
  - 1. Click on the input field of the *Top curve* (reference 7) and enter the curve factor (or use up down control of spin box near the input field).
  - 2. Redo the same operation with the other curves: *Right curve* (reference 8), *Bottom curve* (reference 9), *Left curve* (reference 10).

or

Set the 4 sides alignment manually by using arrows (reference 13):

- 1. Click on a side/curve (e.g. reference 12) to select it, then use up/down/left/right arrows (reference 13) to reach the desired position.
- 2. Redo the same operation with the other side/curves.

*Tip:* Combination of theses arrows with [SHIFT] or [ALT] keys on keyboard allows to optimizing positioning. See section dedicated to *positioning accelerator* in "Scaling", page 163.

- 6. Click **Discard** (reference 15) allows to remove all the modifications done in the previous steps.
- 7. Click **Restore** (reference 16) allows to reset the masking (zero position).







The clock indication (reference 1) next to local time indicates the local time as set by selecting the local time zone (reference 2).

Automatic Daylight saving time mechanism can be enabled or disabled (reference 3). If disabled, the daylight saving time must be adjusted manually (reference 4).

To limit a clock deviation, the local time must be synchronized with the real UTC time. Depending on the synchronization source (automatic or manual synchronization), the deviation is limited within certain limits:

### Manual clock adjustment

If there is a small difference between the actual UTC time and the UTC time displayed on the projector and you cannot connect to a Network Time Protocol server (NTP server), you can use manual synchronization (reference 6) instead. Using this method, you can enter an offset value between -360 and +360 seconds (reference 7).

A maximum offset of 360 seconds (6 minutes) per calendar year can be used using this method.

### Automatic clock adjustment (NTP server)

If you have access to a Network Time Protocol Server (NTP), it is recommended to synchronize the projector to it. Using this method, the internal clock of the projector will be continuously synchronized with the NTP server. Any deviation between the NTP server and the projector will be in the order of milliseconds.







Selecting **Normal mode** (reference 1) means that the light source will operate at the designated power level (no power adaptation to meet constant light output). You can change the power level by dragging the slider (reference 2) or manually entering the power value (in %) (reference 3).

Selecting **CLO mode** (reference 4) forces a constant light output of the projector over a certain period. This will eliminate uncontrolled light output drop caused by natural aging of the light source. The light output is checked every 5 minutes, if the target is not met, the laser power is adjusted. You can change the target light output by dragging the slider (reference 5) or manually entering the power value (in foot-Lambert) (reference 6).

Next to the light output mode, you can also select the desired **White Point Target** (reference 7). While technically the native white point should be correct, it may vary slightly from the DCI specifications or to the REC 2020 space color specifications. If this happens, the option is available to adjust the white point to the chosen standard.

You can choose between the following calibration files:

- Native white point calibration.
- DCI-2D (Recommended for 2D color calibration)
- Rec.2020 and Rec.709 2D
- DCI-3D (Recommended for 3D color calibration)
- Rec.2020 and Rec.709 3D

Also available, on the bottom of this menu, there is the option to enable **Light Recovery Mode** (reference 8). When the projector is connected to a UPS and this option is selected, the light will recover to its original state after a power failure lasting longer than 5 seconds.

Color calibration has to be done for each projector laser mode and aspect ratio and starts with the white point calibration.

During this white point calibration, the color coordinates are measured and uploaded. At the same time the option exists to save these coordinates can be saved in an MCGD file.

When saving the coordinates in an MCGD file, the color gamut calibration can be skipped. When the coordinates are not saved, then you have to proceed with color gamut calibration.

- Color gamut calibration (electronic P7 correction). Measured values are saved in the Measured Color Gamut Data (MCGD) file. This calibration needs to be repeated for each used format (FLAT/SCOPE) and for each used projection mode (2D/3D).

For more info about MCGD files and color gamut calibration, see "Projector color", page 207.

 Verify the corrected colors by comparing to select target colors. The target colors are stored in Target Color Gamut Data (TCGD) files. Several TCGD files are already available in the file system of the projector.

For more info about TCGD files and verifying colors, see "Verifying the colors after correction", page 211.

- **9.** Arrange calibration files in a macro. To apply correct color calibration it is important that the MCGD file (s) and matching TCGD file(s) are activated after that the INPUT file and PCF file are activated. For that it is recommended to create a macro where the files are loaded one by one in the right order:
  - 1. First activate the INPUT file.
  - 2. then activate the PCF file (PCF already contains plane 1 information),
  - 3. then activate the MCGD and TCGD files.

# 9.2 Light source – White Point calibration

## 9.2.1 About the light source white point calibration menu

### Location & access

Menu: Configuration > Color calibration > Light source

Level: Administrator, Service technician

### About white point calibration

The projector uncorrected white point ( $W_n$ ) has to be shifted towards the DCI white point ( $W_t$ ). The coordinates of the DCI white point ( $x_w$ =0.314 ;  $y_w$ =0.351) are embedded in the projector software and cannot been changed. The coordinates of the projector uncorrected white point has to be measured and entered.




Image 9–1 Shifting projector 'white point' towards desired white point (laser power calibration)

The projector uncorrected white point can be defined by measuring the xy coordinates of the uncorrected primary colors (red, green, blue) and uncorrected full white separately.

The initial set of xy values stored in the projector for the uncorrected white point are the same as for DCI white point. After white point calibration, the initial values are overwritten with the measured values.

Based on the measured values the projector can balance the Red, Green, and Blue light to move the projector uncorrected white point towards the desired white point. This adjustment is called 'Laser RGB correction' or "Light Source calibration".

The projector uncorrected white point is different for 2D projection and 3D projection. Therefore, the projector uncorrected white point has to be measured and entered for each projection mode separately. Per projection mode one set of measured values are stored. Depending on the projection mode, the corresponding set is used for white point correction.

In case of 3D projection, the xy coordinates of uncorrected white has to be measured for each 3D file separately.








Image 9-27 27 points of calibration

1. While in *Configuration > Color Calibration > Spatial color calibration* (SCC), click the **Select all files** icon in the banner at the top of the SCC files list (reference 1).



# 10.1 Allocating a macro to a general purpose input (GPI)

#### Location & access

Menu: Configuration > Projector automation > GPI

Level: Administrator, Service technician

#### What is rising and falling edge?

The status of a General Purpose Input (GPI) can be either high or low. This means the following:

- Low: The voltage between GPI P and GPI N is lower than or equal to 0.5V.
- High: The voltage between GPI P and GPI N is higher than or equal to 5.0V.

This translates in the GPI menu into Rising edge and Falling edge. This means the following:

- Rising edge: The GPI goes from a low status to a high status (e.g. from 0.5 to 5 V).
- Falling edge: The GPI goes from a high status to a low status (e.g. from 5 to 0.5 V).

#### What is possible?

The *GPI menu* allows you to allocate a macro file to a rising edge and/or falling edge on one of the general purpose inputs (GPI) of the projector.

There are 8 GPIs available on the projector but only five of these inputs are configurable. The other three are pre-defined and cannot be modified:

- GPI 1 is reserved for 3D L/R input references. This reference indicates which frame is Right and which frame is Left depending and the used polarity. For more info, see 3D settings.
- GPI 2 is reserved for 3D L/R display references. The reference indicated which frame of eye data will be displayed during a specific display frame.
- GPI 3 is reserved for power control.

# 10.2 Associating a general purpose output to a system event

#### What is possible

The *GPO Event editor* allows you to allocate a system event to a GPO. Also, you can choose the type of action the GPO will take when the associated event triggers.

For example, you can link the projector events **Light On** and **Light Off** to a High and Low action of a GPO. This so that this GPO can trigger the theater curtains to open/close and the theater lights to dim / brighten depending on the status of the Projector Light source.

You can allocate events to five GPO's (GPO 4 to GPO 8). GPO's 1-3 are reserved by the system.

#### Menu overview

This menu allows to allocate system events to GPOs (general purpose outputs) available in the Cinema Controller. You can set the GPO in a certain state depending the event to trigger processes in the theatre or control room.

Each event displayed here has a name (reference 1), the name of its allocated GPO + the type of action (reference 2) the GPO will take when the associated event triggers. If no GPO is associated with the event, *Not configured* is displayed instead.




Image 10-4 Example of the GPO Event editor for the event "Caution raised"



#### Overview

Devices that could be used for automatic actions can be configured during adding a device. Multiple devices of the same type can be added to the ICMP-X by using a different device name. This device name will be used to identify the port.

The following devices are available:

- JNIOR : Ethernet I/O controller Device. This device provides a full suit of solutions (additional GPIO) to
  make digital cinema automation easier. It makes it possible to control e.g. the theater infrastructure such as
  lights, sound, etc..
- TCP : all devices that use the TCP protocol. Transmission Control Protocol is an Ethernet connection to send simple user messages.
- UDP : all devices that use the UDP protocol. User Datagram Protocol is an Ethernet connection to send user messages in quick way but without guaranty that the message is received.

When adding a device, the following must be configured before the device can be used:

- Device name: a unique readable name of the device.
- Hostname/IP: IP address of the device in the theater network.
- Port: IP port number associated with the device.
- Login: used by the ICMP-X, in combination with the password, to establish communication with the remote device.
- *Password*: used by the ICMP-X, in combination with the login, to establish communication with the remote device.



Ports, logins and passwords must be retrieved from the unit manufacturer and are not provided by Barco.



#### Overview

Automation Cues are automatic events that are triggered from different sources. Activation of a cue can trigger actions (commands) that will be executed by the automation engine.

There are 3 automation cues types available:

- User Cues (output cues): cues that are configured on the ICMP-X and can be executed by the end user manually or can be executed by the Player during the projection of a show playlist (cues inserted inside the SPL).
- **Input Cues**: predefined cues that are triggered on the detection of an input by modules (e.g. GPIO events).
- **System Cues**: predefined cues that are triggered by software modules when detecting a new condition (e. g. Player events).

Command: when an event cue is triggered, the ICMP-X automation engine will execute all actions (commands) that are configured for the event cue. The Commands must have a target device (module that will implement the action), a Command Name to identify the command and some Parameters and an optional delay.

#### **User Cues**

A user cue type must be defined in a group of cues (e.g. Light, Projection lamp, etc.) in order to present the cues to end users with additional settings.





There are several certificates available in this menu:

- Projector identity certificate: this certificate is used to digitally identify the projector. The projector certificate is used by example for the KDM generation. This certificate need to be signed by the Barco helpdesk.
- HTTPS certificate: This certificate (also called SSL certificate) is used to establish a secure connection to
  the WebCommunicator. This certificate need to be downloaded from the projector web site and manually
  installed on the user Web browser. For further details see "Installing SSL certificate to enable HTTPS
  protocol", page 50. Once the certificate is installed the HTTPS protocol is enabled and the future
  connections will be established automatically as long as the certificate is valid. This certificate has a limited
  life period (2 years max), this is the reason why a renew button is available to regenerate new certificate
  during periodic (programmed) maintenance operation. This certificate is based on parameters like the
  network configuration (e.g. Domain name) and need to be regenerate when these parameters change.
  This certificate need to be signed each time it is regenerate by a certificate authority (CA) to be valid.







### About the Dark screen detection

The error is reported when the following conditions are combined :

- The player is in scheduled mode
- The dark screen trigger is active in the scheduler settings
- A CPL (composition playlist) is playing (or paused) OR an alternative input is selected
- The projector light source is off (or ICMP output remains black) for at least the amount of seconds configured in the Schedule settings

The error is not reported :

- when playing a black clip from ICMP special clips.
- on a slave projector except if that slave is playing in standalone mode.
- when a delay is automatically added to sync a 3D system.

# 13.4 Immersive sound

### Location & access

Menu: Configuration > Media server > Immersive sound

Level: Administrator, Service technician

### About immersive sound

As there are different audio processors in the market, some typical configurations must be done.

The audio processor should be configured by adding its IP address and activating the function in Web Communicator. The protocol for the audio processor should be selected. Once all these actions are done, the audio processor can be used in Web Commander.

### How to setup and activate

1. While in *Configuration > Media sever > Immersive sound*, enter the IP address/hostname of the immersive sound input of the audio processor (reference 1).



*Tip:* Click **Reset** (reference 6) to return to the default values.

# 13.5.1 About audio channel configuration

### Location & access

Menu: Configuration > Media server > Audio channel

Level: Adminstrator, Service technician

### Overview

The audio content in digital cinema is a multichannel sound system which can produce spatial sound signals to reproduce a sense of realism. Each channel is dedicated to a specific speaker.

The audio channel page allows to map the audio channels (content) on the audio output (AES outputs of the ICMP-X).

Within the content, audio channels are identified by labels (e. g. L, R, C...) according to predetermined standards (SMPTE 5.1, SMPTE 6.1 ...), or by default labels (CH01, CH02 ...). To assign an audio channel to an AES audio output, the desired label must be add to the output channel.

The ICMP-X has 16 AES audio output channels but all outputs must be activated. An optional attribute is used to indicate whether the AES output channel is physically connected or not. This is currently mainly informative for technicians.

Several standards are available by default including Auro and AuroMax.

# 14.1.1 About network configuration

### Location & access

Menu: Configuration > System access> Network configuration

Level: Administrator, Service technician

### Overview

This panel is used to define the network configuration of the projector and, when present, the network configuration of the mediablock. Click on the network interface you want to set in the list (reference 1).

When the projector network interface (reference 2) is displayed, modify the auditorium name (reference 3) and configure the network.

A switch (reference 4) allows to choose the setting mode. Two configuration modes are available: Automatic or Manual.

In manual mode, parameters (reference 7) are editable and must be adjusted manually.

In automatic mode, DHCP (Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol) server provides settings which will be applied to the projector's network configuration. Network parameters (reference 7) are not editable (greyed out).

Host name (reference 5) and Domain (reference 6) are editable in both cases.

F

The host name is the name given to the projector in the local network and will be used to identify it over DNS if that is configured. Domain is the name given to the local network. It will be required to reach the local network from an external point (like the Internet). If you were trying to connect to the projector from external point, you need address it by using its IP address or with its full name (e.g. hostname.domain.com). It is preferable to use the second method to address a projector because the IP address can sometimes change (e.g. when the assignment of the IP address is automatically managed by a DHCP server).



Allow legacy protocol check box (reference 6) must be activated when a third party equipment need to send API over Ethernet commands to the projector using the legacy protocol as used on Series 2 projectors. A third party equipment could be a TMS, an automation device, an IMB/IMS installed in the projector or any other equipment which need to operate the projector. The commands available are controlling the basic features of the projector such as Light ON/OFF, Dowser Open/Close, Execute Macro...


Discard button (reference 7) allows to restore last configuration (removing unsaved user modifications).

Save button (reference 8) allows to save modifications.

### **Ethernet Connections**

Ethernet is a networking technology commonly used to communicate with local area network (LAN) and wide area network (WAN). This protocol requires an IP address, Subnet-mask, default gateway and DNS server address.

These parameters can be automatically applied from DHCP server or need to be adjusted manually.





### Subnet mask

A number that is used to identify a subnetwork so that IP addresses can be shared on a local area network.

#### **Default Gateway**

A router that serves as an entry point into and exit point out of a network. For example, a local network (LAN) may need a gateway to connect it to a wide area network (WAN) or to the Internet.

#### **DNS** server

Computers, Projectors, Touch panels connected to a network are referenced by their IP address. The only problem is that remembering IP addresses is not easy. If you need to use hundreds of addresses then it will become impossible to remember them. This is why domain names are created. Internet names (domain and host names) are just aliases to these IP addresses. When you use an Internet address it is automatically translated to an IP address. In fact a program or device that translates those Internet names to IP addresses is called a DNS Server.

#### Host name

This is the name that will be returned, along with the IP address in response to the UDP broadcast query for projectors/touch panels.

#### DHCP

Dynamic host configuration protocol. DHCP is a communications protocol that lets network administrators manage centrally and automate the assignment of IP addresses in an organization's network. Using the Internet Protocol, each machine that can connect to the Internet needs a unique IP address. When an organization sets up its computer users with a connection to the Internet, an IP address must be assigned to each machine. Without DHCP, the IP address must be entered manually at each computer and, if computers move to another location in another part of the network, a new IP address must be entered. DHCP lets a network administrator supervise and distribute IP addresses from a central point and automatically sends a new IP address when a computer is plugged into a different place in the network.





#### About Marriage

For security reasons, projector and mediablock (ICMP-X or ICP-D) are linked together via an anti-tampering system. Physically replacing mediablock will introduce marriage tamper between the projector and mediablock. This is the reason why the technician who inserted a new mediablock must finalize the installation procedure by entering a marriage PIN code (see installation manual for more details concerning the entry of PIN code via touch display located on *Input & Communication* side of the projector).

Entering a pin code is a registered operation. So for traceability reasons, it is recommended to create a PIN code for each user supposed to perform a marriage operation.

PIN code must contain up to 8 digits. These digits can be any combination of the digits 1 to 9. *12345612* is provided as default PIN code.



## 14.5 Multi projectors

#### 14.5.1 About Multi projectors

#### Location & access

Menu: Configuration > System access > Multi projectors Level: Administrator, Service technician

#### Overview

This panel allows to manage slave and master projectors in multi projectors configuration. A multi projector setup is used in e.g. a 3D setup where the first projector projects the left image and the second projector the right image.

One projector must be designed as master and the others as slaves. The *Multi projectors* list is created on the master (all slave projectors must be known by the master).

There are several tabs in the Multi projectors panel that corresponding to several kinds of multi projector configurations:

- Linked ICMP, used by example in 3D setup where the first projector projects the left image and the second projector the right image.
- Linked CLO, used when it necessary that several projectors are using the same light output.

The use of several multi projector configurations in same time is possible.

#### Linked ICMP

This tab is available when ICMP is present in the projector.

A chain of 50 Ohm coaxial cables (equipped with BNC connectors) is used to connect the sync signal between each projector. The number of slaves is theoretically not limited.

In the *Multi projectors* list, each slave projector is designed by its IP address (reference 1) or by its Host name. Both master and slave projectors need to be on the same projector control network.

*Player Frames* parameter (reference 2) indicates if the slave plays the right or the left image, or the both in same time.

*BNC mode* parameter indicates the protocol used by the slave for the BNC cable sync (this link allows a correct synchronisation between the master and the slave). The following protocols can be used:

- Sync: default sync signal (used value if the slave is not the last one in the chain of multi projectors).
- Ltc: Linear time code (usually used for the last slave in a multi projectors configuration).



Using the **Edit** icon (reference 4), you can display the *Edit* window of the concerned slave projector and modify its settings (Ip address, played frames, BNC mode).

Using the **plus** button (reference 6), you can add new slave projector. You can remove a slave projector using the **trash bin** icon (reference 5).


The only available parameter for the Master projector configuration is the *Player Frames* parameter (reference 7) that allows to choose if the master plays the right or the left image, or the both in same time.

#### Linked CLO

This multi projector mode use the local network. It is based on IP addresses of projectors. No additional link is needed between the projectors.

When 2 projectors are projecting on the same screen, e.g. for projecting 3D images, then it necessary that both projectors are using the same light output, otherwise a difference in brightness will be visible between both images.

To obtain this goal, one projector will be set as master and this master will manipulate the target CLO value of the slave so that the lamp output will be aligned between both projectors. When the lamp output of the master changes, then the lamp output of the slave will follow.



In the *Slave projectors* list, each slave projector is designed by its IP address (reference 1). Both master and slave projectors need to be on the same projector control network.

Icon (reference 2) symbolizing the connection with the slave remains crossed out until the link between the master and the slave has been confirmed by using **verify** the button (reference 4).

To identify easily the slave projector, a bar code and the serial number of the targeted machine is displayed (reference 3).

Using Directly the **plus** button (reference 7) to add new slave projector (*Add projector as slave* window is displed). You can remove a slave projector using the **trash bin** icon (reference 6).

Using the **Edit** icon (reference 5), you can also display the *Add projector as slave* window to directly replace current projector by another one in the list.

In the *Master projectors* list (reference 8), a list of master projectors already defined in the network is displayed.

#### **Product information**

- Model : Indicates the Model of the projector (e.g. DP4K-xx).
- Article number: Indicates article number of the projector (e.g. R90xxxxx).
- Projector serial number: Indicates the serial number of the projector.
- ICMP/ICP serial number: Indicates the serial number of the ICMP (Integrated Cinema Media Processor) or ICP (Integrated Cinema Processor) present in the projector.
- Firmware version: Indicates the software package version installed on the device.
- Lens: Indicates the lens installed on the device.

#### **Network information**

- **Host name:** Contains the host name assigned to the projector to identify it in the theater network (e.g. projector1).
- **IP address:** Contains the IP address of the projector required for network communication (e.g. 10.98.0.245).
- **Subnet:** The subnet mask is the number that is used to identify a subnet so that IP addresses can be shared on a local area network (e.g. 255.255.254.0).
- **Default gateway:** Contains the default gateway IP address of the projector (router) required for network communication (e.g. 10.98.0.1).
- **Configuration:** MANUAL or AUTO. Indicates if the IP address has been assigned manually by user or automatically by DHCP (Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol) server.

#### Overview

The complete list of errors, warning and maintenance messages is displayed in this menu. Operational notifications and hardware errors encountered on the projector and the Cinema Processor (ICP or ICMP) are grouped in the same list.



Hardware errors reported here are generally resolved by a technical intervention. Operational errors are easier to solve and generally requires just an operator intervention. This last category of error is more common and is often due to problems with invalid content.




Image 15-3 Diagnostics > Monitoring > Notifications

#### **Messages filtering**

Some tabs on the top of the list allow you to filter messages:

- Active: click on this tab allows to display all message still actives (not solved). Error messages are displayed first in this list, followed by warnings and finally you will find eventual info messages not already automatically solved.
- Since boot: click on this tab allow to display all messages activated since last projector start. Messages are filtered by creation dates (most recent message in on the top of the list).
- **History**: this tab allows to load and display list of all maintenance messages raised on the projector. Messages are filtered by creation dates (most recent message in on the top of the list). To save system resources, this list is not automatically displayed. It is necessary to activate the message display by pressing **Load** button.

#### **Notification description**

Notifications are given with an identifier (code error number), a date and a description. An icon indicates the error level.

There are three error levels:

• Error:

Icon composed with a white cross on a red circle indicates an "Error". This error must be resolved as soon as possible to prevent damage to the projector and perform the show.

Warning:

Icon composed with a white exclamation mark on a yellow triangle indicates a "Warning". This warning must be resolved as soon as possible to prevent future issues with the projector and allows providing a complete performance during the show. An unresolved Warning can quickly escalate and become an error.

Info:

Icon composed with a white exclamation mark on a blue circle indicates an "Information" message. This type of message are used to signal a modification of the projector status or to indicate that maintenance action is needed.





- High Error: indicates the maximum authorized threshold for this sensor. An error is generally raised by the system when this limit is exceeded.
- Low Error: indicates the minimum authorized threshold for this sensor. An error is generally raised by the system when this limit is exceeded.
- High Warning: indicates limit value above which the system raised a warning to indicate possible issue with this sensor.
- Low Warning: indicates limit value under which the system raised a warning to indicate possible issue with this sensor.




Image 16–5 Web Analyzer




Image 17-4 Example of a software package inserted via USB device






Image 17–6 Example of the prompted reboot message

Status (reference 3) is Operational when laser bank is up and running.

If the system detect an issue on a laser bank its status (reference 3) is change to *warning*. A non-functional laser bank doesn't prevent projector operation, but multiple notifications will be triggered regularly.

Use **deactivate** and **activate** buttons (reference 4) to hide/unhide these notifications. When the Laser Bank notifications was desactivated, status (reference 3) of concerned banks is change to *blocked*.



It's recommended to resolve laser bank issues as soon as possible to prevent future issues with the projector and allows providing a complete performance during the show.

#### How deactivate/activate Laser Bank notifications

## **19.4 Vacuum cleaning of the dust filters**

#### When to vacuum clean the dust filters?

The dust filters should be checked every month. If the filters are contaminated with dust then cleaning the filters with a vacuum cleaner should be sufficient. In case the filters feel greasy these must be washed. See cleaning procedure "Washing and drying the dust filters", page 343.



Grease on the filter can build up after several months in an environment contaminated with greasy air. Note that areas where popcorn is consumed are subject to greasy air.



This procedure assumes that the dust filters are removed from their slots.

#### Required tools

Vacuum cleaner with soft brush suction nuzzle.

#### How to vacuum-clean the dust filter?

1. Carefully vacuum the air inlet side of the dust filter. Use a vacuum cleaner with a soft brush suction nuzzle. The air inlet side of the dust filter is the side which is surrounded with a glue edge.



*Tip:* Lightly tap the filter on its dusty side to expel heavy dust contamination.



*Tip:* Compressed air is also permitted to clean the filters but take care not to damage them.



Caution: Do not damage the dust filter. Replace damaged dust filters immediately.

## 19.5 Washing and drying the dust filters

#### About filter washing and drying


For environments where popcorn grease and such can contaminate the filters, Barco advises the client to purchase one extra set of filters to cover drying time, as well as taking following extra precautions and instructions pertaining to filter cleaning and drying.

#### Cleansing agent

To clean sticky, greasy dust filters we suggest usage of Sodium carbonate crystals (Na<sub>2</sub>CO<sub>3</sub>). Sodium carbonate (Often called washing soda, soda crystals, or sal soda in the detergent section of stores) is widely used to effectively remove oil, grease, alcohol stains ... The product itself is relatively safe, sodium carbonate is used in toothpastes and as a food additive (E500). Potential Hazards are described in the section "Hazards", page 387.







This cleaning procedure assumes that the filters are already removed from their slots.

Take into account that the time needed to dry the dust filters may be 24 hours or more. For that, it's recommended to have a second set of dust filters which can be used while cleaning the first set.

#### **Required tools**

- Bucket with hot water
- Sodium carbonate, 30 gram (handful) per liter hot water

#### How to wash and dry the dust filters?

1. Make a solution with a ratio of 30 gram (a handful) sodium carbonate to 1 liter hot water.

Maintenance procedures

- 2. Soak the dust filters in the solution for **30 to 60 minutes**. The grease should be dissolved after 1 hour.
- 3. If the dust filter is still clogged repeat this procedure from step 1.
- 4. Rinse the dust filters with clean water to flush all grease residue away.
- 5. Shake out all excess liquid by repeatedly swinging the filter to-and-fro in a centrifugal action.

#### 6. Then allow the filters to dry thoroughly.

*Note:* Drying time of the dust filters can be up to 24h or more. Drying time can be shorter when being done in a well-ventilated area.



*Tip:* To speed-up drying, allow the filter(s) to dry at 50°C max in a well ventilated room.



**CAUTION:** UNDER NO CIRCUMSTANCES SHOULD WET FILTERS BE INSTALLED BACK INTO THE PROJECTOR. THIS CAN HAVE SERIOUS SAFETY CONSEQUENCES AS WELL AS JEOPARDIZE THE INTERNAL OPTICS OF THE SYSTEM.



**CAUTION:** Do not install/use damaged dust filters. Replace damaged dust filters immediately with new dust filters of the same type. See <u>https://my.barco.com</u> for the correct replacement part.

## **19.6 Cleaning the lens**



To minimize the possibility of damage to optical coatings, or scratches to lens surfaces follow the cleaning procedure as described here precisely.

#### **Required tools**

- Compressed air
- Clean micro fiber lens cleaning cloth (e.g. Toraysee® cloth(s))
- Clean cotton cloth
- Lens cleaner (e.g. ZEISS lens cleaner, Purosol™ or other water based lens cleaner products)

#### How to clean the lens?

- 1. Blow off dust with clean compressed air (or pressurized air cans<sup>4</sup>).
- 2. Clean with lens cleaner together with a clean lens cleaning cloth to remove the dust and contamination. Use big wipes in one single direction.

*Warning:* Do not wipe back and forwards across the lens surface as this tends to grind dirt into the coating.

- 3. Use a dry lens cleaning cloth to remove left liquid or stripes. Polish with small circles.
- 4. If there are still fingerprints on the surface, wipe them off with lens cleaner together with a clean lens cleaning cloth. Polish again with a dry one.



If smears occur when cleaning lenses, replace the cloth. Smears are the first indication of a dirty cloth.

<sup>4.</sup> Pressurized air cans are not efficient if there is too much dust on the surface, the pressure is too low

## **19.7 Cleaning the exterior of the projector**

#### How to clean the exterior of the projector ?

- 1. Switch off the projector and unplug the projector from the mains power net.
- 2. Clean the housing of the projector with a damp cloth. Stubborn stains may be removed with a cloth lightly dampened with a mild detergent solution.

# **19.8 Authorization to clear a security warning on the projector**

#### When is an authorization required to clear the security warning?

A media player security warning is triggered in the following cases:

- If a board is removed from or inserted into the card cage.
- If the link between ICP and IMB/IMS is removed.
- If the sealed compartment has been opened.

An authorization will be required to clear the security warning. Using the Web Communicator as a show manager, you can create an authorization pin code in case one of these security warnings is triggered.

#### **Required tools**

- Authorization pin code
- Web Communicator

#### Authorization procedure to clear security warning

- 1. Ensure that all modules and boards are properly installed.
- 2. Start up the projector (READY or ON mode).
- 3. Log onto the projector using Web Communicator.
- In the notifications menu (both in Web Communicator or on the touch display), spot the error that can be cleared and press Clear.




Image 19–8 Location of the key button




Image 20–1 Sliding the front cover away from the projector




Image 20-2 Sliding the rear cover away from the projector




Image 20-3 Sliding in the rear cover




Image 20-4 Sliding in the front cover






Image 21–2 Sliding the front cover towards the frame bar and removing it.







Image 21–5 Sliding in the rear cover





Image 21-6 Positioning the safety bracket





Image 21-8 Sliding in the front cover

# A.5 ICMP-X SDI specifications

#### 3G-SDI

Serial Digital Interface (SDI) is a serial link standardized by ITU-R BT.656 and the Society of Motion Picture and Television Engineers (SMPTE). SDI transmits uncompressed digital video over 75-ohm coaxial cable within studios, and is seen on most professional video infrastructure equipment. The first revision of the standard, SMPTE 259M, was defined to carry digital representation of analog video such as NTSC and PAL over a serial interface and is more popularly known as standard-definition (SD) SDI. The data rate required to transmit SD SDI is 270 Mbps. With the advent of high-definition (HD) video standards such as 1080i and 720p, the interface was scaled to handle higher data rates of 1.485 Gbps. The 1.485-Gbps serial interface is commonly called the HD SDI interface and is defined by SMPTE 292M, using the same 75-ohm coaxial cable. Studios and other video production facilities have invested heavily on the hardware infrastructure for coaxial cable and have a vested interest in extending the life of their infrastructure. Fortunately, SMPTE recently ratified a new standard called SMPTE 424M that doubles the SDI data rates to 2.97 Gbps using the same 75-ohm coaxial cable. This new standard, also called 3-Gbps (3G)-SDI, enables higher resolution of picture quality required for 1080p and digital cinema.


#### Standard HD-SDI signal (Single Link)



Standard HD-SDI allows for a single 4:2:2 image to be carried on one cable at 1.485 Gb/s. The image uses the Y Cb Cr colorspace and uses a bit depth of 10 bit per color component.

Due to the data rate limitations only 23.976, 24, 25, 29.970 and 30 fps streams are achievable.

#### **Dual-Link HD-SDI signal**



Dual-Link HD-SDI is mainly two standard HD-SDI signals carrying a single image stream split between the two cables. The main advantage is that color subsampling is no longer required, and the image can be transmitted in 4:4:4 quality, which then also allows the RGB (or XYZ) color space to be used.

The main link will contain a standard HD-SDI signal, the second (enhancement) link contains the missing Cb and Cr samples.

Depending on the implementation the enhancement link could also contain extra information to increase the bit depth.

#### **3G HD-SDI signal**



3G HD-SDI uses a higher data rate (2.97 Gb/s). This allows a single cable interface to achieve the same capabilities of a Dual-Link HD-SDI implementation.

In direct mapping (level A) this is used to achieve higher frame rates. (50, 59.940 and 60 fps streams are supported).

#### Dual Stream 3G HD-SDI signal



Dual Stream 3G is a specific variant of the 3G signal which combines two completely separate 4:2:2 image streams into a single 3G signal. This can be used to transmit stereoscopic streams by keeping the left and right eye signals together.

# A.6 ICMP-X HDMI 2.0 specifications

#### HDMI

HDMI (High-Definition Multimedia Interface) is a compact audio/video interface for transferring uncompressed video data and compressed/uncompressed digital audio data from a HDMI-compliant device ("the source device") to a compatible computer monitor, video projector, digital television, or digital audio device. HDMI is a digital replacement for existing analog video standards.

#### **HDMI 2.0 specifications**

BT.709 and DCI-P3 are supported for all formats. For HDR content (UHD and 4K only) the BT.2020 color coding is supported.

#### HDCP

Both HDMI 2.0 inputs are HDCP 1.4 & HDCP 2.2 compliant.

#### HDR (SMPTE ST 2084)

HDR (High Dynamic Range) is supported on all UHD and 4K formats.

This includes SMPTE ST 2084 (static metadata) and BT.2020 color coding. Requires a license!

#### HDMI 2.0 Cable requirements

All HDMI cables should work with HDMI 2.0 receivers. There is no such thing as a "4K HDMI cable" even though this is sometimes sold this way. But of course there are quality differences. The "high-speed" cables would be preferred over the "standard-speed" cables. They usually work at higher cable lengths than the standard-speed ones.



The "Premium Certified HDMI" cables are tested to work with high bandwidth as is the case with 4K HDR content. These can be more expensive though. When using active and/or optical cables you should verify if the integrated receiver and sender are HDMI certified to guarantee to work compliant with the HDMI protocol. You can request the HDMI certificate to the manufacturer of the cable.

The ICMP is not supporting Ethernet-over-HDMI and such specific cables are thus not required.

# **B.1 About General Purpose Inputs & Outputs** (GPIO)

The Barco Cinema Controller and the Barco ICMP-X are equipped with GPIO ports. The electrical specifications described in this chapter are the same for both GPIO ports.

#### **General Purpose inputs**

The Barco Cinema Controller and the Barco ICMP-X have each eight (8) opto-isolated general purpose inputs available. These inputs are used to trigger the execution of macro files. For more explanation about the association of a macro to a GPI, consult the user guide of the Communicator.


#### Input voltage

The inputs can be directly driven from a TTL or CMOS output.

- The shape of the pulse must be rectangular.
- The duration of the pulse must be at least 50 milliseconds (shorter pulses are considered as a switch bounce)
- Minimum voltage : V<sub>min</sub> = +5 V
- Maximum voltage Cinema Controller: Vmax = +24 VDC
- Maximum voltage ICMP-X= +18 VDC

#### External power supply

When interfacing with contact closure outputs, an external power supply needs to be provided. Depending upon the configuration a suitable pull-up resistor needs to be added as well.



#### Cables

When long cable connections are required the use of shielded cables with twisted pairs is recommended. One twisted pair is to be assigned to each GP Input pair.

#### How to make the connection

When the power supply used to provide the DC voltage is isolated from ground (for example in the case of an AC adapter) it is recommended that the minus pole of that power supply is connected to ground (or to the projector chassis). This will avoid high common mode voltages at the projector GP Inputs. If that same power supply is used for other parts of the system, take care not to create ground loops. In any case when shielded cables are used that shield should be connected to the projector chassis.

#### **General Purpose outputs**

The Barco Cinema Controller and the Barco ICMP-X have each eight (8) opto-isolated outputs available. Four (4) of the outputs on the Cinema Controller are dedicated for TI. The other general purpose outputs can be controlled via software.


#### About an output

The output can generate a falling edge, rising edge, toggle or continuous toggle.

- **Generate Falling Edge** generate a falling edge on the external GPO port if the present state of the output is high. If the present state of the external GPO is low, no edge will be generated.
- **Generate Rising Edge** generate a rising edge on the external GPO port if the present state of the output is low. If the present state of the external GPO is high, no edge will be generated.
- **Generate Toggle** generate a toggle on the external GPO port. If the present state of the output is low, a rising edge will be generated, followed by a falling edge. If the present state of the output is high, a falling edge will be generated, followed by a rising edge. Pulse width = 20 milliseconds.
- Generate Continuous Toggle This command will generate a continuous toggle of the external GPO port. This toggle will continue until a *Generate Falling Edge*, *Generate Rising Edge*, or *Generate Toggle* command is received. The rate of toggle is 24 Hz.

#### **Output transistor**

- Maximum output driving voltage : V<sub>max</sub> = 24 V
- Maximum current : I<sub>max</sub> = 30 mA
- Maximum power dissipation : 120 mW



When the GPO driver inside the projector becomes powerless the GPO state changes to the default state. The default GPO state depends on the external system connected with the GPO port (pull-up or pull-down circuitry).

#### **GPIO and projector ECO mode**

The Freya projector is equipped with an "ECO" mode, in which a minimum of features are available. Entering or leaving ECO mode can be done with GPIO of the Cinema Controller via a predefined Macro (not editable). However, this cannot be done with the GPIO of the ICMP-X.

The GPO signals of the ICMP will return to their default output level when the projector is switched to ECO mode. This could generate unexpected "Falling Edge" triggers at the output pins. Also when awakening the projector (from ECO mode to READY mode) the GPO signals of the ICMP may generate unexpected "Rising Edge" events.

#### GPO and projector switching On or Off

The GPO signals of the Cinema Controller and ICMP will return to their default output level when the projector is switched to OFF. This could generate unexpected "Falling Edge" triggers at the output pins. Also during power-on the GPO signals may generate unexpected "Rising Edge" events.



#### About 568A and 568B on an Ethernet connector RJ-45

TIA/EIA-568A and -568B are two standards for connecting Category 3 and Category 5 wire to connectors. Both are appropriate for high speed data, though 568B is somewhat more common for installed wiring and 568A is more common in jumpers. There is no performance advantage either way. The only real difference between the two is the order in which the pairs are used (orange and green).

Hold a cable as if to plug it into a wall jack, the locking tab down (contacts facing you). The contacts are numbered 1-8 from left to right. Here's what you will see:

#### 3G-SDI

Serial Digital Interface (SDI) is a serial link standardized by ITU-R BT.656 and the Society of Motion Picture and Television Engineers (SMPTE). SDI transmits uncompressed digital video over 75-ohm coaxial cable within studios, and is seen on most professional video infrastructure equipment. The first revision of the standard, SMPTE 259M, was defined to carry digital representation of analog video such as NTSC and PAL over a serial interface and is more popularly known as standard-definition (SD) SDI. The data rate required to transmit SD SDI is 270 Mbps. With the advent of high-definition (HD) video standards such as 1080i and 720p, the interface was scaled to handle higher data rates of 1.485 Gbps. The 1.485-Gbps serial interface is commonly called the HD SDI interface and is defined by SMPTE 292M, using the same 75-ohm coaxial cable. Studios and other video production facilities have invested heavily on the hardware infrastructure for coaxial cable and have a vested interest in extending the life of their infrastructure. Fortunately, SMPTE recently ratified a new standard called SMPTE 424M that doubles the SDI data rates to 2.97 Gbps using the same 75-ohm coaxial cable. This new standard, also called 3-Gbps (3G)-SDI, enables higher resolution of picture quality required for 1080p and digital cinema.

#### **Default Gateway**

A router that serves as an entry point into and exit point out of a network. For example, a local network (LAN) may need a gateway to connect it to a wide area network (WAN) or to the Internet.

#### DHCP

Dynamic host configuration protocol. DHCP is a communications protocol that lets network administrators manage centrally and automate the assignment of IP addresses in an organization's network. Using the Internet Protocol, each machine that can connect to the Internet needs a unique IP address. When an organization sets up its computer users with a connection to the Internet, an IP address must be assigned to each machine. Without DHCP, the IP address must be entered manually at each computer and, if computers move to another location in another part of the network, a new IP address must be entered. DHCP lets a network administrator supervise and distribute IP addresses from a central point and automatically sends a new IP address when a computer is plugged into a different place in the network.

#### **DNS** server

Computers, Projectors, Touch panels connected to a network are referenced by their IP address. The only problem is that remembering IP addresses is not easy. If you need to use hundreds of addresses then it will become impossible to remember them. This is why domain names are created. Internet names (domain and host names) are just aliases to these IP addresses. When you use an Internet address it is automatically translated to an IP address. In fact a program or device that translates those Internet names to IP addresses is called a DNS Server.

#### HD

Hazard Distance (HD) is the distance measured from the projection lens at which the intensity or the energy per surface unit becomes lower than the applicable exposure limit on the cornea or on the skin. The light beam is considered (to be) unsafe for exposure if the distance from a person to the light source is less than the HD.

#### HDMI

HDMI (High-Definition Multimedia Interface) is a compact audio/video interface for transferring uncompressed video data and compressed/uncompressed digital audio data from a HDMI-compliant device ("the source device") to a compatible computer monitor, video projector, digital television, or digital audio device. HDMI is a digital replacement for existing analog video standards.

#### Host name

This is the name that will be returned, along with the IP address in response to the UDP broadcast query for projectors/touch panels.

#### IP

Internet Protocol. The network layer of TCP/IP. Required for communication with the internet.
